Illustrated Lecture To Be Given Wednesday At Court House On Park

The first of two series of illustrated Park lectures will be given here, Wednesday, July 18, at the court house at 8 o'clock. Richard C. Burns, Park naturalist, will be in charge, and give as his lecture, "Through the Years In The Great Smoky Mountains National Park."

Many Fail To Comply With OPS Price List Rule

Sellers of services in the Charlotte OPS district, who were required to file ceiling service price lists by June 15, were told today that only about half their number have complied with the OPS order.

J. Ray Shute, district deputy director, pointed out the fact that no extension has been granted and that violators of the order (CPR 34, Sec. 18) are subject to full penalties.

Public display of ceiling prices is also required of retailers.

Mr. Shute said many of the businesses which filed used such expressions as "\$1 and up" and "two to four dollars," which are not permissible, and the district office was forced to return the list. Listings showing maximum and minimum charges are also unacceptable.

Businesses covered by this regulation are ones offering any type of service for which it made a charge during the base period of December 19-January 25, and include service stations, barber shops, dry cleaners, repair shops, television services, and contractors of all types.

Lions To Sponsor Auction Sale Sat.

The Waynesville Lions Club will start off their new year with an auction sale at the Esskay Galleries Saturday morning at 10:00 o'clock.

3 More Vehicles Collide On Curve East Of Hospital

A three-vehicle wreck caused six o'clock Friday afternoon about \$400 property damage, but no personal injuries, according to Patrolman Bryan Basden, investigator. The wreck happened just beyond the curve on Highway 19A-23 near the Drive In Theatre.

Patrolman Basden said that a new Oldsmobile, driven by Walter Rollman, headed towards the Lake, had stopped in order to make a left turn into a drive-way. A line of traffic was coming into Waynesville, when a Ford, said to have been driven by Jimmy Davis, came

upon the stopped car. The collision knocked the front end of the stopped car into an approaching log truck.

The front left, and rear right of the Oldsmobile was damaged, and the left side of the Ford, Patrolman Basden said he is continuing the investigation, and estimated damages as about \$400 to both vehicles.

There have been numerous wrecks in this curve, with five deaths resulting.
