Student Research Belies Theory

MORGANTON, W. Va. — (AP) — A West University graduate student says research he conducted proved false a belief that industrial waste such as fly ash might be used successfully as a component of glass. The study was made by Robert D. Bittle of Oakland, Md., to meet requirements for a master's degree. He is an employee of the Allegheny Ordnance Works at Frostburg, Md. "A variation in composition, a major factor in glass production, makes the industrial use of fly ash discouraging," Bittle says. He recommends, however, a continuation of research with particular emphasis on the contribution of specific oxides to the properties of glass. Bittle used fly ash from the Morgantown Ordnance Works and a soda lime glass for base material in his experiments.
