

Don't Shoot Before You Read This

Hunting and fishing regulations have many "exceptions" which apply to Haywood county and are of importance to the hunter and fisher. The bear season, for example, runs from October 15 to January 1, but in that part of this county south US Highway 19A-23 bear may not be taken through November 19 through December 8.

Deer hunting in Haywood is limited to the same dates: November 19 through December 8, with the exception of the country that lays north of US Highway 19A-23, which is closed to deer hunting entirely.

The open season on raccoon and opossum (with dogs and guns) is from October 15 through January 15, and the bag limit is one per person or two per party.

Rabbits have no exceptions, the season being from November 22 through January 31. Squirrel hunting, however, in Haywood is divided: from September 15-October 1, and from November 22 to January 15. The limits are six per day and 75 per season.

You may hunt quail during the regular season, November 22-January 31, but your bag is limited to six per day and 75 per season. Ruffed Grouse can be hunted in Haywood from November 1 through January 31.

It is a good idea to read all the fine print in the regulations, for there may be some exception that applies to you.

Flamingos Thrive At Hialeah

MIAMI — (AP) — There are about 550 flamingos on exhibition at Hialeah race track. The rare birds were originally imported from Cuba, but more than half the present flock were hatched and raised at Hialeah, the only place flamingos have been successfully propagated outside their native habitat. The birds are fed a special diet of cooked rice, shrimp, ground dog-biscuit and cod liver oil.

Gears Shift At Champion As The Chestnut Makes Its Bow

The Champion Paper and Fibre Company at Canton closed the book recently on a 48 year old phase of activity, and, in doing so, demonstrated advance planning can get a new volume underway without a single ink spot.

The activity was the Extract Department which has utilized chestnut wood, both alive and dead, to supply the world's tanners and chemical houses with a high grade

25% extract.

The program began in 1908 with live chestnuts and continued with dead trees after the blight hit the supply more than 20 years ago. It was obvious then that unless the blight was checked, the process was headed down a one-way street. No answer could be found; the trees continued to die and disappear as the years rolled by. Planning for the future began.

In the interval, however, more than 2,580,000 pounds of extract was produced, both dry and liquid. It was shipped to 12 foreign countries, with the United Kingdom buying more than any other.

But the end was inevitable, and the other day it came. Plans were ready, however, and a multi-million dollar project involving extensive revisions in the hardwood pulp system is already underway. Men who worked in the now dead Extract Division had new jobs waiting for them, and the shifts were made smoothly and easily. The lost pulp tonnage will be increased by the use of mixed hardwoods instead of chestnuts.

The Chestnut is dead, but Champion lives.
