background of woodwardia fern and emerald leaf. The center of interest was a wedding arch decorated with southern simlax and white asters and gladioli with baby's breath interspersed throughout. The arch was topped with a bridal bell fashioned from lace and lilies. Flanking the arch were baskets of white asters and gladioli. Seven branched candelabra holding Cathedral candles were placed throughout the decorations. The family pews were marked with candles and white flowers.

A program of wedding music was presented by Mrs. Paul Morrow, organist, and Mrs. W. H. Nelson and Mrs. Fred Martin of Waynesville, aunt of the bride, vocalists. Before the ceremony Mrs. Morrow played "Traumerei", Schumann; "Serenade", Schubert; "O Thou Sublime Sweet Evening Star", Wagner; "Ava Maria", Bach-Gounod; and "Clair de Lune", Debussy. Mrs. Martin sang "Because", "At Dawning", and "O Perfect Love".
