Miss Jane Troy Wyche Weds Archibald Charles Craft, Jr.

Miss Jane Troy Wyche, daughter of Mrs. Thomas Troy Wyche and the late Mr. Wyche of Waynesville, became the bride of Archibald Charles Craft, Jr., of Wilmington and Orangeburg, S. C., Saturday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock in the First Methodist Church.

The bridegroom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Archibald Charles Craft of Wilmington.

The Rev. J. E. Yountz, pastor of the church, performed the double ring ceremony.

The chancel was decorated with arrangements of white hydrangea and hemlock, interspersed with seven branched candelabra.

Eugene Charles Craft, organist of Myers Park Methodist Church of Charlotte, uncle of the bridegroom, and Mrs. Daniel R. Hubler, vocalist, of Cincinnati, Ohio presented a program of wedding music.

Mr. Craft played "Claire de Lune," by Debussy, "Adagio," from Beethoven's Pathetic Sonata, "Liebestraum," by Liszt, "Evening Star," by Wagner, "Andante Cantabile," by Tschickowsky, "September Song," and "Always," Mrs. Hubler sang "I Love Thee" by Grieg, "Still As the Night," by Bohm preceding the ceremony and "O Perfect Love," by Bloomfield after the vows were spoken.

The bride was given in marriage by her uncle, J. Russell Brown of Greensboro. She wore a gown of white slipper satin with a fitted bodice, bouffant skirt which extended into a court train, an off-shoulder effect formed by an illusion yoke outlined with a Chantilly lace bertha. The long tapered sleeves ended in calla lily points at the wrists. She wore her mother's fingertip veil of illusion attached to a Juliet cap of lace and

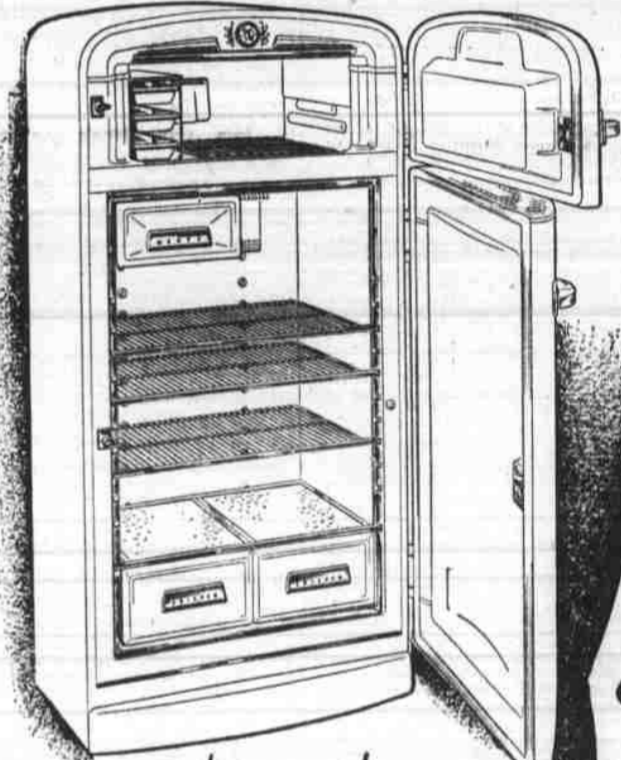
