Mrs. James R. Boyd Wins Flower Show Sweepstakes

Miss Louise Ballard Is Runner-Up

Mrs. James Boyd won the sweepstakes prize in the annual Flower Show held by the Richland and Mountain View Garden Clubs at the Waynesville Armory, Tuesday and Wednesday. Miss Louise Ballard of Lake Junaluska was runner-up for top honors.

Two exhibitors won the tri-color award—the highest rating given by flower show judges. These went to Mrs. W. M. Cobb for her shadow box arrangement of marigolds, entered under the classification, "I Found It In The Attic"; and to the West Canton Home Demonstration Club for its display of various flower arrangements.

More than 400 exhibits and arrangements were shown with a special section devoted to the 75 ar-

rangements entered by Haywood County's Home Demonstration Clubs. Horticulture specimens were shown for the first time in bamboo containers.

The show was based on the theme, "Living Out Of Doors" and the center of interest was an outdoor scene, featuring a garden pool, picnic table, and fireplace against a background of evergreens and red geraniums. The scene was arranged by Mrs. M. G. Stamey and her committee.

Also attracting special interest were the Wildlife arrangements by Mrs. J. W. Ray and the entries of Walter Toliaferro.

Displays of dahlias by J. B. Ivey of Lake Junaluska and Thomas L. Campbell, Sr. of Holly Springs Garden and the professional display of Clyde Ray, florist, won high praise from the visitors and added beauty to the show.

Special features included a display of books on gardening, arranged by Miss Margaret Johnston, Haywood County librarian.

Judges for the show were Mrs. Ralph McLean, Mrs. W. T. Duckworth, Mrs. John King, Mrs. F. H. Hipps, and Mrs. O. C. Hodges, all of Asheville. They were accompanied by Mrs. George Searle of Asheville, district president of garden clubs.
