'Sudden Death' Tournery Will Begin Monday

Two teams, one of boys and one of girls, have entered the 1951 CDP softball tournament from 16 communities in Haywood county. The tournament, which begins at Champion Park in Canton next Monday, is under the direction of Jack Justice and Nazi Miller, with C. C. Poindexter as county chairman.

All players must live in the community their team represents, and only the teams who have taken part in community tours and picnic are rated eligible.

On Monday, September 10th, West Pigeon girls will play South Clyde girls at 5 p.m., Beaverdam boys will play Ratcliffe Cove boys at 6 p.m. East Pigeon girls will face the Iron Duff girls at 7, and at 8 p.m. West Pigeon boys go against Hominy boys. At 9 p.m. Morning Star boys play the boys from Upper Crabtree.

On Tuesday at 5 p.m., the Cruso girls battle the Allens Creek girls. Thickety boys go to bat against Francis Cove boys at 6 p.m., and at 7 p.m. Upper Crabtree girls confront the maids from Hominy. An hour later Allens Creek boys try to out hit the Center Pigeon boys, and at 9 p.m. the Saunook girls try to do the same thing to the Beaverdam girls.

Wednesday at 5 p.m. brings Francis Cove girls into action against Center Pigeon girls. Iron Duff boys play South Clyde boys at 6 p.m., and following them at 7 comes the Morning Star maidens against White Oak. At 8 p.m. the Thickety girls try their luck against the Lower Crabtree girls. The Morning Star boys end the night's proceedings at 9 p.m. against Upper Crabtree. White Oak boys drew a first round bye.

It is to be a "Sudden death" tournament, where one defeat eliminates a team. The second round of the tournament begins on Thursday, September 13, and continues on Monday, the 17th. No games will be played on Friday and Saturday, and in the event of rain, the entire schedule will be moved up one day.

The semi-finals are arranged for Tuesday, September 18th, and the finals for the following day. Trophies for the champions will be donated by the Powell Lumber Company, and the Stone Paint & Wall Company, both of Canton. Champions last year were the East Pigeon girls and the Allens Creek boys.

The Black Bears are not too big as a whole. Their line averages about 170 pounds, and their backfield averages five pounds less. Richard Rowe is considered the best passer on the team, and Ray Morgan the best kicker.

A senior tackle, Ronnie Hall is already having the drums beat for Blue Ridge Conference honors this season. Paul Henson is one of the best centers on defense to be found in this vicinity. He's also good at tearing open a hole on offensive play.

The Bears plan to taper off preparations tonight under the lights. The game is set for Memorial Stadium in Asheville. Tickets may be purchased both in Canton and Asheville.

Catamounts At Cullowhee Expect A Better Season

Football practice began at WCTC last Saturday with 80 men climbing into uniform. Only 19 of the total number are lettermen, but since last year's team was about the worst in Tom Young's five years of coaching the Catamounts, it is difficult to believe that he is too unhappy about that.

The schedule this year calls for three home games, four games on the road, and two in Memorial Stadium in Asheville. The season opens on September 15th against East Tennessee. New on the program for the Cats is Catawba, a consistent tough team that often goes beyond its league to tackle Southern Conference teams. That game will take place in Asheville on October 6th.

BE IT ORDAINED
THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN
OF THE
TOWN OF HAZELWOOD

A new section be added to the Code of Ordinances of the Hazelwood to be designated as Section 9, Article II, Chapter as follows:

Section 9. KEEPING POULTRY—DISTANCE FROM RESIDENCE. No person shall keep or maintain chickens, ducks, geese or other fowl in the Town unless they are kept in an enclosed poultry yard. No person shall, after January 1, 1951, build a poultry house or poultry yard within seventy-five feet of a residence.

Section 15 of Article IV, Chapter K of the Ordinances of the Town of Hazelwood be and the same is hereby repealed and in its place the following is substituted:

Section 15. HOGS. It shall be unlawful for any person to keep hogs within the corporate limits of the Town from and after January 1, 1951.
