F. Platt residence, to Palmer corner, John Platt residence, Green Valley corner, to church, Ross corner, Green Valley grocery, to Highway 23 at Pleasant Balsam corner, to Fish Hatchery, and retrace to Dayton Rubber corner, to Green Valley road, Swift residence, and retrace highway then to Allens Creek road, Camp Branch road, then to Mull residence, and retrace to Allens-Creek road to R. O. Allen corner, Allen farm, Buchanan corner, Massie corner, again to Allens Creek road, to Wilson residence, and over Allens Creek road to Highway No. 23, down highway to John's place, to Bradley's store, to McCracken corner, to colored school, and back to post office.

The new route two will be at the post office, and first delivery made on old No. 284 at Mauney Cove road. Then out No. 19 to Dellwood, following 19 to Maggie and Campbell Creek road to Campbell's residence, retrace to highway 19 to Peachtree Branch corner and retrace to Black Camp Gap road. Then to Buff corner, and retrace to Hall corner, to Hannah corner on Highway 19, and retrace to Platt corner. Then northerly on old road to Ferguson corner, cross Highway 19 to Dellwood, then along Highway No. 284 to Allison's corner, then west of Messer corner, retrace to Hemphill, and then to Jonathan Creek corner, and old road to Howell corner, and Rock Hill school. Then to Ferguson's barn corner, thence to Fannie corner over old highway to Cove Creek post office, Southerly over No. 284 to Boyd Bridge corner, and

to Iron Duff corner. Continuing northerly to Hill Brook drive to Stephenson corner, retrace to Dodson corner, and then to church, and on to Ferguson's corner on Highway No. 209. Follow No. 209 to Bryson corner, to Antioch church, Davis corner, retrace, and northwesterly to Iron Duff corner. Retrace to Antioch church and Bryson corners, southerly to Yates corner, to Caldwell corner, retrace on Highway 209 to Dotson corner, east to Richland bridge, and then along No. 209 of Ward's corner at Lake Junaluska, and on 19-A-23 to post office.

The routing of new route three will follow No. 284 to Mauney Cove up the cove road to Justice corner, retrace to junction of highways Nos. 284-19. Go east to Rogers Cove road, to Fulbright's corner, and retrace. Then northeast to Medford corner, and on to Leatherwood residence. East on county road to Walker corner and Highway No. 209. South on Highway 209 to Walker corner and Highway 209, then down highway to highway 19-23 to Reeves corner, and to Howell Mill road, on Howell Mill road to McRorie corner, then to Calhoun corner and retrace to Howell Mill road on No. 284. Then through town to East street to Cogdill corner, on down to Frazier corner to Highway 19A-23. Then to Underwood corner, and south to J. M. Medford corner, then to Leopard corner, retrace, and north to Davis corner, continuing north to Nichols corner for a mile and retrace to Stamey Cove corner, south to Byers corner and retrace to Piney Grove corner. Then east to Rhinehart corner, west to Newsome corner, retrace, and southwest to Kelly corner. North to Garner corner, west to Burnett corner, south to Edwards corner, retrace to Francis corner, and southwest to Boone corner and on to post office.

Postmaster Howell said that several pieces of equipment were due to arrive for the extra carrier - including sorting tables and racks. No one has been assigned to the new route, and the appointment is expected to be made from Washington, it was learned here. In the meantime, Postmaster Howell is trying to get equipment in order to inaugurate carrier service to Balsam street to the Balsam Manor apartments. The arrival of the storage mail box will determine when this service can begin, he explained.
