The Haywood County Medical Association has been asked to assist in examining prospective donors in advance so that no one will be brought in who is unable to donate. The local radio station, WHCC, has agreed to give time for programs and spot announcements with which the visit of the Bloodmobile may be widely advertised. A transportation committee, of which Jerry Rogers is chairman, will arrange to bring to the court house, anyone desiring to give blood. Sebe Bryson will handle all such calls desiring transportation.
