## Blue Demons Blasted By Asheville School 52-0

Bethel entertained its second big foe Friday afternoon and the first two minutes were all that were required to show that the optimistic courage of the Blue Demons was insufficient. Christ School had applied a decisive licking, 39 to 0, earlier in the season but Asheville School's total was to be higher—52 to 0.

The game was hardly well underway when Asheville's star tailback J. C. Smith, cut off tackle and went 40-yards for the first score. John Harris kicked the extra point and it was 7 to 0. However, the battle surged back and forth for the remainder of the quarter with Bethel unable to gain and Asheville unable to score. It looked as if a tight contest was developing.

But the hope was soon shattered. Asheville blocked a kick on Bethel's 43, and Smith cocked his arm and let fly a pass to Andy Biggs across the goal line. For once the all-purpose Smith didn't get his kick between the goal posts and the score was 13 to 0.

Bethel tried desperately to get into the ball game, bringing the ball back to their 35 they threw a pass which was incomplete, but, undismayed, Jones kept trying and made a first down on fourth down. A pass from Queen to Jones lost five yards and then Leslie Graham intercepted the next attempt and galloped all the way. Harris kicked the extra and the half ended a few minutes later with the score 20 to 0.

During the half an announcement over the loudspeaker gave Bethel fans their biggest chance to cheer during the entire afternoon and they set up quite a whoop. It was a statement that June Reister of the Haywood County Bank in Canton was giving \$50.00 for the improvement of the Bethel football field.

Coach Hop Arbogast of Asheville was taking no chances as the second half began. Smith was still in the game and he made that quite clear very quickly. Bethel was forced back to her 10-yard line by penalties and the hard charging Asheville line. They kicked to the 29. On the very next play Smith was away around his right to score. The extra point was good and the score was 27 to 0.

Arbogast removed Smith then, and also brought out a couple of other players, but he did not clear his bench by any means. Even the Asheville fans a considerable number of whom had accompanied the team, were asking before the end of the game: "Why doesn't the coach give the other fellows a chance to play a little?"

Bethel, fighting to the last, managed to get a first down on its 40 after a pass from Jones to Capp, but, as happened repeatedly, the next attempt was intercepted. A sustained drive, featuring short gains, began which eventually enabled Allen Barker to take it over. The extra failed and the score was 33 to 0.

The third quarter got going with the biggest thrill coming on an Asheville pass from Graham to Myers that covered 20 yards to Bethel's 8. Jack Finegan carried it over, the extra failed and it was 39 to 0.

The next score came a little later when Asheville recovered a Bethel fumble on the 50. In one quick dash Johnson took the ball to the 20, another run carried it to the 10, and with Johnson still carrying, the next play made it 45 to 0.

Things began to fall apart at that point. The kick put Bethel deep in the shadow of her goal posts, and a desperate passing attack boomeranged when one of the tosses was intercepted and carried over. A penalty, however, nullified the score and gave Bethel a first down. A moment later the pass was tried again, and was again intercepted and carried over from the 30 by Pete Harmon. The kick was good, 52 to 0.

The game ended a moment later with Bethel back against the goal post and tossing a long, long aerial that fell incomplete in the middle of the field.

It was a hopeless battle for Bethel from the start. The bigger, more experienced Asheville line had no difficulty in getting through to rush the Bethel passer or pull down the runner before he could get started. On defense Bethel was equally helpless before the superb blocking of that same line. The Blue Demons battled gamely, their spirits high all the way, but they were completely outclassed by the team that had humbled Canton the week before by 20 to 0.

Bethel threw 18 passes, had six intercepted, and completed seven. Those completed were usually behind the line of scrimmage, however, and very seldom gained more than a yard.

In the words of coach C. C. Poindexter the Blue Demons found their comfort: "We had rather lose badly to a good team than win over a poor one." They surely lost to a good one Friday.

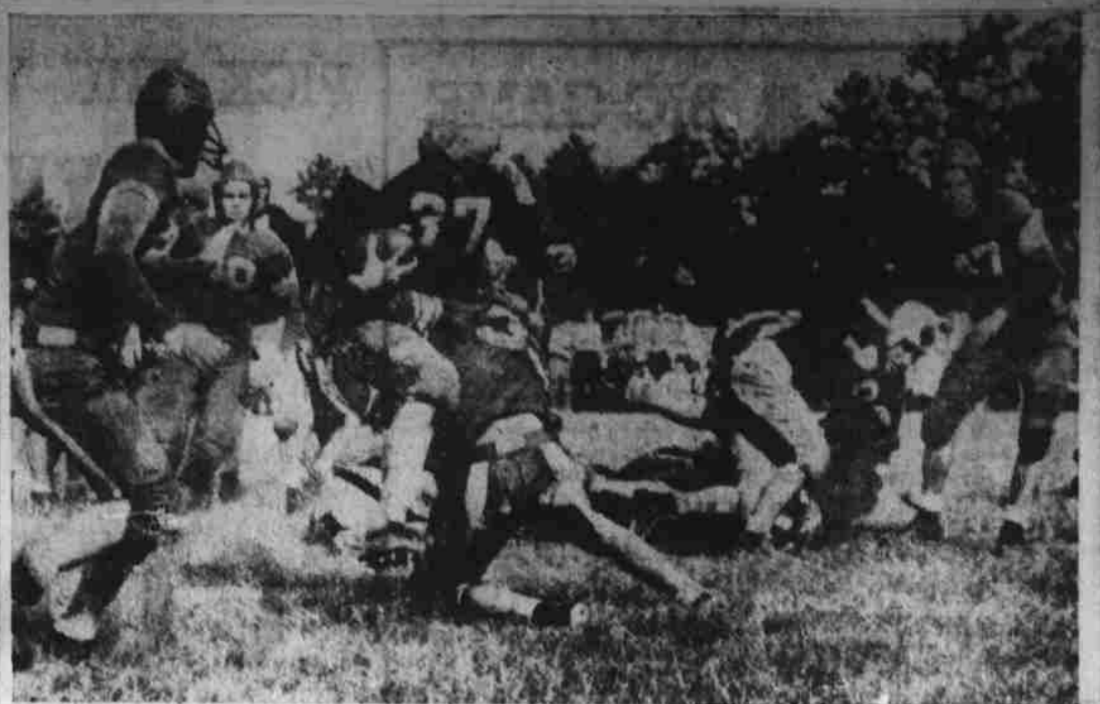
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## Clear The Track, Bud; Morgan's Coming

Accommodations for alumni will be reserved in Taylor and West Halls.

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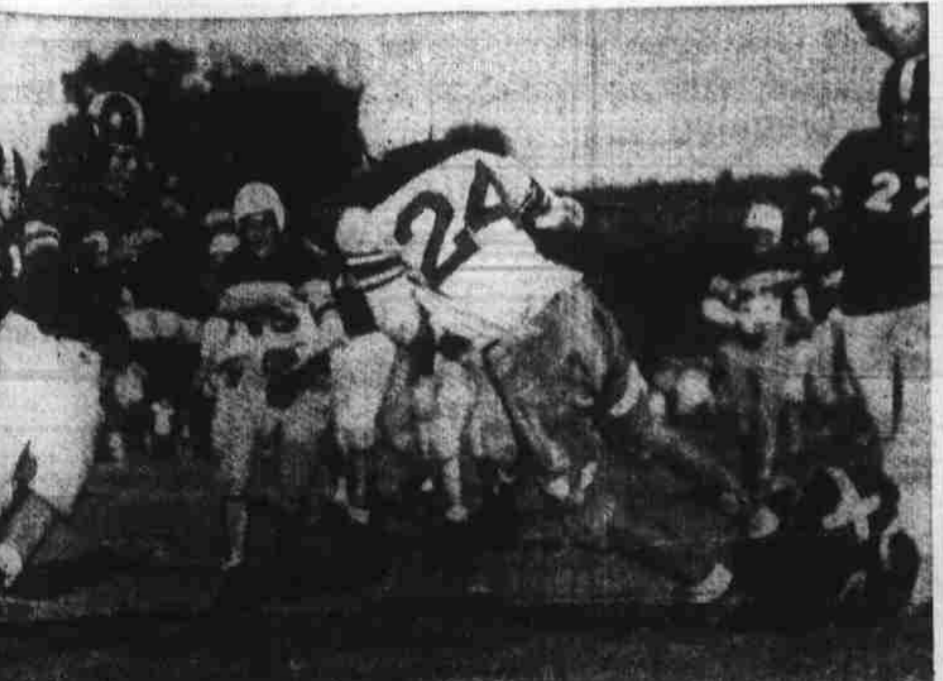
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## Kenneth Jones Hits The Deck
