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Library Board Discusses Plans For Service

A meeting of the Haywood County Library Board was held last Tuesday with Col. J. H. Howell, chairman, presiding.

The members discussed the requirements necessary for the library to continue to qualify for State Aid for the years, 1952 and 1953.

Mrs. T. L. Gwyn, Glenn Palmer, and Col. Howell were named as a building committee to study the present needs and to plan for future growth. It was decided that Miss Elizabeth House, director of the library commission, would be requested to make a survey of the county library service and make recommendations for the library improvement. Her survey will be used as a basis for the Library's Ten-Year-Plan, which must be presented to the North Carolina Library Commission Board by July 1952.

Miss Margaret Johnston, librarian, made a report of the library service for the past three months stating that circulation of books for the period exceeded the same three months of last year by 5,000. She discussed the problem of finding sufficient time to prepare new books for the shelves with the increased demands on the time of the library personnel. She stated that she is faced with a choice of securing additional library assistants or cutting down on the hours of book circulation.

Holidays to be observed at the library will be December 24, 25, 26, and January 1. The Bookmobile will not operate from December 24 until January 2.

Announcement was made of a check for \$100 received from the Harry Putterman Fund to be used for purchase of recordings for the music library.

Col. Howell was re-elected chairman of the board and William Medford was re-elected treasurer. Other members of the board are Glenn Palmer, Mrs. T. L. Gwyn, Fred Douth, and Mrs. Dick Moody. Miss Johnston serves as secretary.

The club voted to donate \$1.00 per member to the Elizabethan Garden which is to be established on Roanoke Island as a project of the State Federation of Garden Clubs.
