

Officials Inspect Original Oil Portrait Of John Wesley



Principals at the annual meeting this week of the Methodist Church's Southeastern Historical Society, held at the Lake Junaluska Assembly, inspect an original painting of John Wesley, founder of the church. The work of the noted British artist, Frank O. Salisbury, the Wesley portrait is soon to have a companion piece in the likeness of Francis Asbury, first American bishop of the church and renowned circuit rider who often visited in the Waynesville area as he trekked over the Smoky Mountains. Clyde Woman's Club To Present Annual Flower Show August 21 and 22

Members of the Clyde Woman's Club will present their annual summer Flower Show Thursday and Friday, Aug. 21 and 22, at the school gymnasium. Exhibition hours for the public will be from 4:30 p.m. to 9 p.m. on Thursday and from 1 p.m. to 7 p.m. Friday. Admission will be a silver offering.

Entries will be in both the horticulture and arrangement divisions that will be judged as follows: each exhibit will be evaluated against 100 points. Entries scoring between 95 per cent and 100 per cent will receive a first prize (blue ribbon) counting three points; between 85 and 94 per cent, second prize (red ribbon) counting two points; and between 75 and 84 per cent, third prize (white ribbon) counting one point.

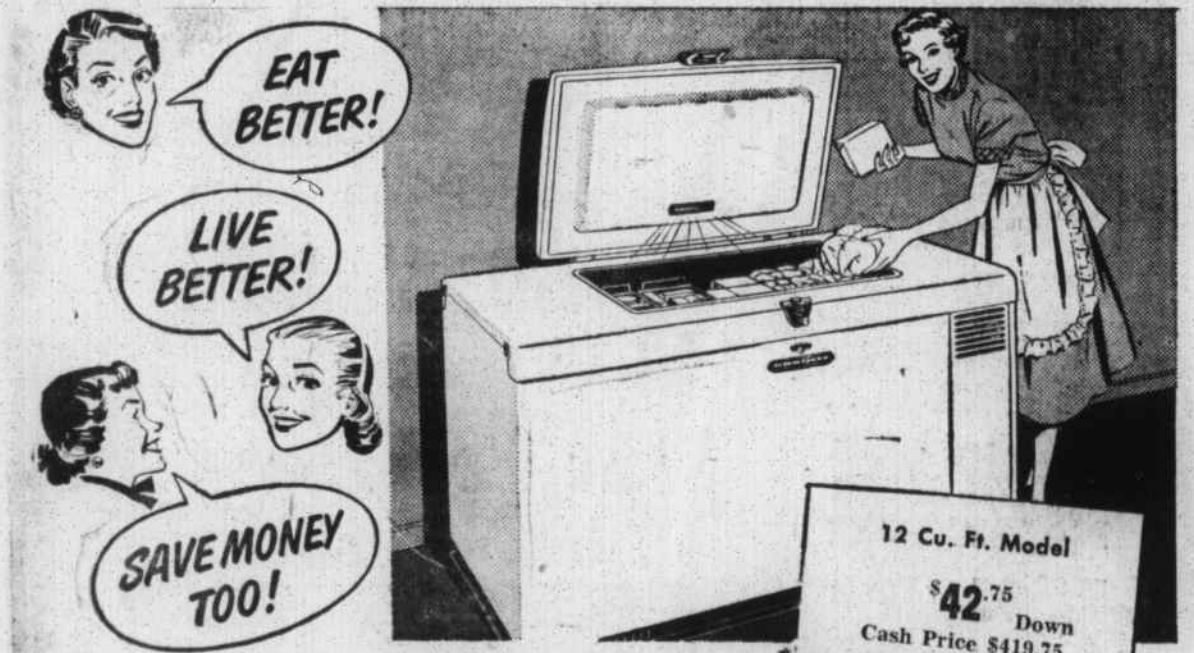
A tri-color award counting five points may be given for excellence above the blue ribbon, one in the horticulture division and one in the arrangement division. A sweepstakes trophy will be awarded to the person having the most points. A plaque will be awarded to the organization receiving the blue ribbon. The plaque will be given permanently to the organization winning it three times.

The two divisions have been divided into a number of sections and classes, with various members in charge. They are:

 Section G. Mrs. Stanley Livingston; Class 1. Wildflower arrangement, and Class 2. Dried flower arrangement.

The following rules will apply to the exhibit:
 1. Entries will open at 8 a.m. Thursday, August 21, and will close at 12 noon the same day. A place will be provided outside the Exhibition Hall for the preparation of entries. All entries must be in place by 12 noon or be disqualified for competition. Judging will begin at 2:30 p.m. on Thursday.
 2. All entries in the Horticulture Division must have been grown by the exhibitor. Naming increases the value of these exhibits and preference will be given named specimens in close decisions.
 3. In the Horticultural classes, uniform containers will be provided for all exhibits unless otherwise specified.
 4. The Club cannot be responsible for containers or properties of exhibitors. All containers should be properly marked on the bottom with owner's name.
 5. No person will be allowed in the Exhibition Hall during judging except the judges and officials.
 6. Exhibits must be removed between 7:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. on Friday and between 10:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. on Saturday.



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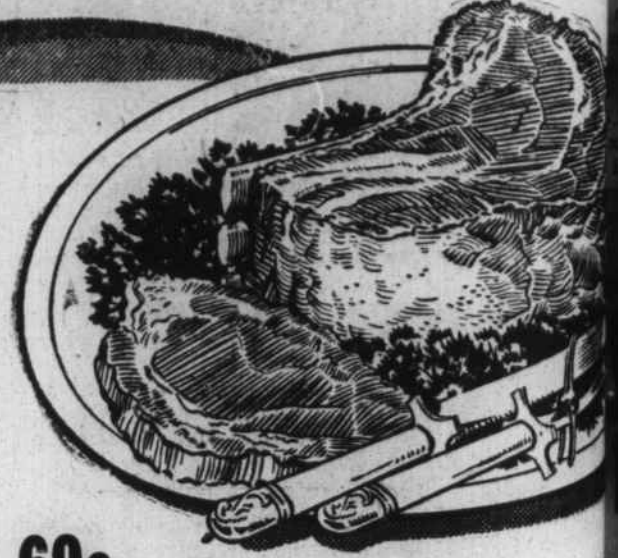

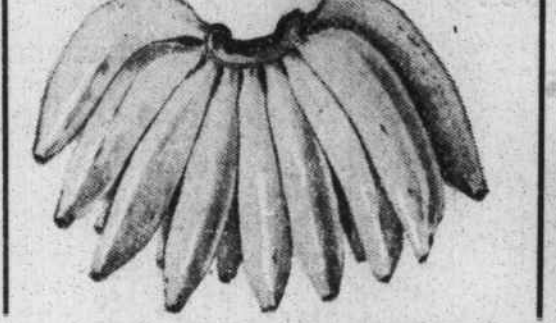
