

Children of prominent families were sent to schools and colleges beyond Cherokee county. From Old Salem in North Carolina went missionaries of the Moravian Church in 1801, followed by servants of the gospel of other religious denominations. Gradually the lands of the Tribe

were reduced by treaty, sale, or fraud. When gold was discovered in Georgia, there was a grand rush for Cherokee land in that state. Oppressive laws were passed painfully restricting members of the Cherokee nation. Finally the government decreed that the Cherokee should be moved west, and in 1838 they were forced to leave their homes, and take the long trail to-Oklahoma. Some of the Indians fled to the mountains and took refuge in the Great Smokies, where
