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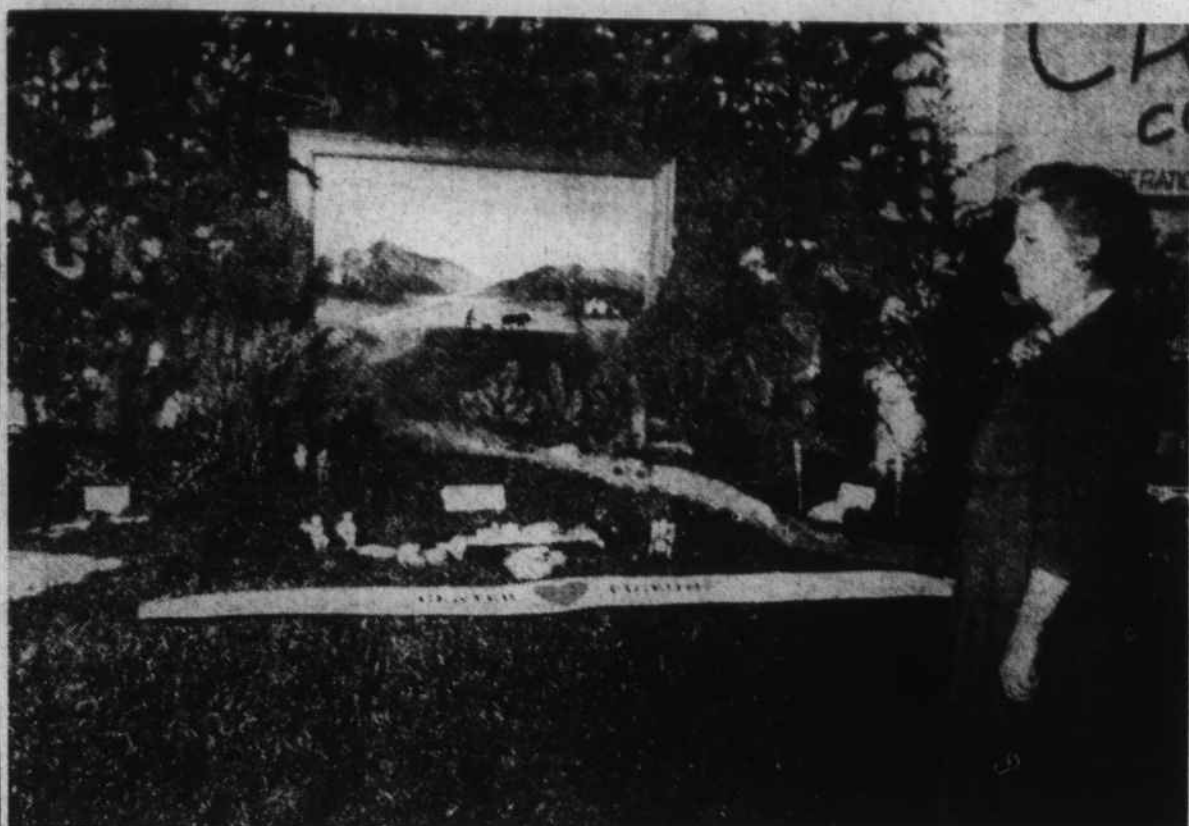

9 Changes Made By Methodists In Haywood

Eleven changes were made in the 34 charges of the Waynesville District of the Methodist Church at the annual Western North Carolina Conference which closed in Charlotte yesterday. Nine of the newly assigned ministers will come to Haywood County.

The Rev. J. E. Yountz returns to the First church at Waynesville for his fourth year and the Rev. W. H. Groce returns to Canton Central. The Rev. W. Jackson Huneyutt also returns as district superintendent.

The new ministers in Haywood County include the Rev. D. A. Payne, who goes to Long's Chapel from Lindsey Memorial in High Point, replacing the Rev. Paul Duckwall, who goes to Midway church in the Thomasville District.

The Rev. R. J. Hahn, who is a transfer from the Kentucky conference will go to Hazelwood replacing Mrs. M. B. Lee, who was sent to Whittier.

The Rev. K. L. Roberts goes to the Canton First Church from Mount Holly and the Rev. L. E. Mabry was sent to Newlyn Street, Greensboro.

The Rev. George C. Starr, Jr., who was transferred from the Virginia Conference, was sent to Clyde replacing the Rev. W. T. Modlin, who was assigned to Faith (See Methodists—Page 6)

County Tourist Group To Meet Wednesday Night

Bart Leiper, newly elected promotional director of the 12-county Western North Carolina Highlanders, Inc., will discuss plans for next year and make suggestions as to how those plans can best be carried out at the next monthly meeting of the Haywood County Tourist Association, L. E. DeVous, president, said today.

The meeting, scheduled for Wednesday night, October 1, will be held in the Court House at 8 o'clock.

In announcing the meeting DeVous traced all members of the association to be present to hear Mr. Leiper's suggestions.

The Board of Directors of the Western N. C. Highlanders, Inc. voted unanimously Friday to make Waynesville the headquarters for the coming year of the 12-county organization.

The Highlanders is an organization that was organized officially at the Directors' meeting. It had previously been known as the Western N. C. Tourist Association.

The group, which met at Masonic Building, also elected officers with O. A. Fetch, resident manager of Fontana Village selected for his second term. Other officers are John Parris of Sylva, Director of Publicity for "Unto These Hills," vice-president; Paul Hyatt, owner of the Piedmont Hotel, treasurer; and Mrs. Doyle D. Alley, who was re-elected secretary. Additional members of the executive committee are Miles Sater of Asheville, and James Meyers of Bryson City. Bart Leiper is executive vice-president of the organization.

President Fetch appointed Paul Hyatt chairman of the finance and budget committee, and named John Parris head of the publicity-promotion committee.

Director Paul Hyatt reported that the Haywood County Tourist Association had turned over a check in full for its quota under the new budget. Haywood was the only county able to report that complete collections had been made, although several representatives said their total quotas had been pledged.

Following the selection of Waynesville as headquarters for the Western N. C. Highlanders, Mr. Leiper said:

Contracts Are Awarded For Building New High School Building Here

Contracts for the new Waynesville High School, Vocational Building were awarded last Friday to the lowest bidder, with the general work going to Jerry Liner for a bid of \$307,102. Mrs. Lucy Jones, superintendent of schools, announced today.

The total cost of the building will be \$391,379 and is part of the \$2,000,000 bond issue for improving school facilities in the county.

Mrs. Jones said final approval of the contracts must be made by State officials at Raleigh. Work on the building will undoubtedly start in October, she said.

The vocational building will be constructed adjoining the present high school. It will contain nine classrooms for special classes plus a gymnasium and cafeteria. The superintendent said she hoped the building will be ready for use next fall.

The following contracts were awarded:

General construction — Jerry Liner, \$307,102; plumbing — Young & Brookshire, \$31,500; heating, T. C. Malone, \$29,997; and electrical Home Electric Co., \$22,780.
