If you want to keep your glass cooking utensils from breaking, protect them from sudden changes in temperature.

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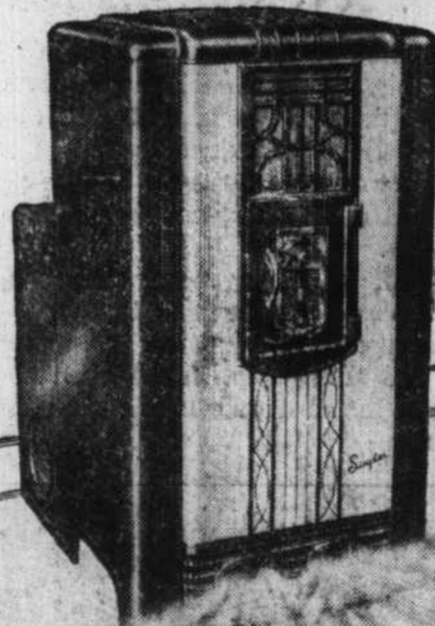
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
