In the words of the American Library Association, the American Heritage Project is being promoted "to provide opportunities for men and women to meet together regularly and discuss the problems of today in the light of the basic documents, ideas and experiences which constitute our American Heritage". Its aims are "to help people become better informed—to gain awareness of their responsibilities as citizens in a democracy—and to achieve a willingness to apply their own thinking in building better communities".

Only twenty-five libraries in North Carolina are participating in the project.
