### Bad Weather Ruined Most Of Past Tobacco Parades

#### **Tobacco Industry** In Haywood Is Thirty Years Old

The year 1952 marks the thirtieth anniversary of the founding of the tobacco industry in Haywood County.

W. Clark Medford, who authored a special story in The Mountaineer's tobacco issue last year, said the first tobacco grown in the county was planted in 1923 by William Morrow, lower Jonathan Creek farmer. According to Mr. Medford's account, "Uncle Tom" Yarboro, 88, veteran tobacco grower of the county, gave Mr. Morrow credit for being first and took second credit for himself.

That first tobacco crop, a small one to be sure, was harvested and sold at Greeneville, Tenn. The next year there was another crop, that of Mr. Yarboro,

And Mr. Yarboro said he had planted that same patch of burley ever since, either he or his tenant, and the quality was always the same.

The tobacco industry in Haywood county has come a long way since those days. This year's crop is estimated to be worth one and a half million dollars.
