Melt 3 tablespoons margarine or butter. Blend in 3 tablespoons flour. Add 1 1/2 cups milk, stirring constantly. When thick add 1 cup grated cheese, 3 hard-cooked eggs, sliced; 1 cup luncheon meat, cubed; 3/4 cup cooked peas.
