Refreshments were served by the hostess during the meeting and the Valentine motif tried out.

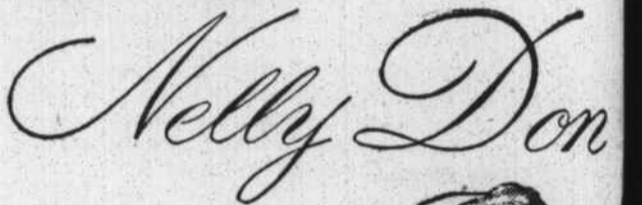
Mrs. Stamey Will Speak At PTA Meeting
