My Favorite Recipe

MRS. CHARLES BURGIN



ANGEL FOOD CAKE

1 cup sifted Swansdown Cake Flour
1 1/2 cups sifted granulated sugar
1/4 cups egg whites
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon almond extract
1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
1 teaspoon vanilla

Sift flour once, measure, add 1/2 cup sugar; sift four times. Beat egg whites and salt with rotary egg beater or flat wire whisk. When foamy, add cream of tartar; continue beating until eggs are stiff enough to hold in peaks, but not dry. Add remaining 1 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons at a time, beating with beater or whisk after each addition until sugar is just blended. Fold in flavoring. Sift about 1/4 cup flour over the mixture and fold in lightly; repeat until all is used.

Turn into ungreased 10-inch tube pan. Cut gently through batter with knife to remove bubbles. Bake in moderate oven, 375 degrees, 30 to 35 minutes. Remove from oven and invert pan 1 hour, or until cake is cold.
