Although the exact quota for the Waynesville chapter has not been determined, it was thought to be approximately \$5,000. More than 80 per cent of this amount is used locally, the other 15 per cent goes to national headquarters.

Williamson particularly requested his committeemen make every effort to be fully organized by the time the drive begins so that all business and residential areas be covered during the first week. It was pointed out that school children will not be solicited since there is an active Junior Red Cross which has already had its fund campaign. Only exception is the Waynesville High School which will be included in the coming drive since it did not take part in the previous one.

The four main categories of services offered free of charge by the Red Cross were outlined to the group by Mrs. Ethel McDarris, only professional Red Cross employee in this area. These services cover help of any kind to service men and their families; aid in any local disaster such as fire, flood, explosion or the like; help to poor families; and the maintenance of the blood bank including gamma globulin in case of polio epidemic, and other emergencies.

It was noted that fifteen of the thirty rural communities in the county are included in the Waynesville Red Cross, particularly all those west of Clyde. They are Saunook, Allens Creek, Francis Cove, Ratcliffe Cove, Fairview, Lake Junaluska, Iron Duff, Upper Crabtree, Crabtree, Fines Creek, White Oak, Jonathans Creek, Maggie, Deilwood and Cove Creek.
