JOE HOWELL, JR. AT HOME

Pvt. Joe Howell, Jr., who recently completed basic training at Camp Gordon, is spending two weeks with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Howell, on Maple Street. He will report for duty at Killeen Base, Texas where he will serve as security guard at the Atomic Energy plant for the remainder of his enlistment. He is with the Military Police.

Miss Margaret Johnston, Haywood County librarian, is leaving Saturday for Cleveland, Ohio where she will begin a 14-week study of adult education methods, which will take her to a number of libraries over the country.

Miss Johnston is making the study under a \$3,200 special grant from the Fund for Adult Education, a fund established by the Ford Foundation.

She will spend the first two weeks at the Cuyahoga County Library and the third week at the Cleveland Public Library, after which she will go to Akron to observe the Adult Education Test Center, one of seven such centers in the nation. From Akron she will go to Denver, Colo., for two weeks and from there to Salt Lake City to observe television at the University. Tentative plans include libraries in California and Miss Johnston will conclude her special study in Baltimore, Md.

Miss Johnston has been given a leave of absence of three and a half months to permit her to take advantage of the grant. During her absence, Mrs. Marjorie Beal, former director of the North Carolina Library Association, will act as librarian.

Miss Johnston was one of 71 men and women (including only five librarians) granted awards totaling \$199,950 to improve their effectiveness as volunteers and professionals concerned with the liberal education of adults.

Miss Johnston came to Waynesville ten years ago this month when the Haywood County Library was established, and has rendered invaluable service to the county. During the ten-year period the circulation books at the library has increased from 11,000 a year to 90,000 and the number of books on the shelves has grown from around 4,000 to approximately 21,000.

It was also through Miss Johnston's efforts that the Bookmobile was acquired a few years ago, giving residents of the rural communities full advantages of library service.

Other additions have included a music library with fine recordings which are circulated in the same manner as books, and a collection of educational films.

Miss Johnston, who has also taken an active part in other civic affairs since coming to Waynesville, is president of the Waynesville Business and Professional Women's Club and has held offices in the Waynesville Woman's Club. She is a member of the council of the American Library Association, representing the Public Library Division.
