
He's followed that trade ever since he came to the United States in 1905 and found trouble getting work because of his handicap.

In desperation, he finally hung out a sign at the rooming house where he was staying in New York advertising himself as a one-armed paper hanger and painter. It was only after he was awarded a contract to redecorate some apartments that he began worrying over how he would manage a job he never had tried before. But it was easier than he thought,

"I just figured out how to do it and everything fitted right in place," he said.

He's still at it and going strong, refusing to accept social security payments in spite of his 67 years.

"As long as I'm able to work, I'm not going to take social security money from the government," he declares. "Only when I'm flat on my back and there's NO other way."
