To Stretch Clothing Bill Take Good Care Of Clothes

"Good clothing care can be as easy as saying your ABC's," according to Mary Em Lee, State College extension specialist in clothing.

Good clothing care merely implies the kind of simple care that everyone can easily put into practice at home.

Air your clothes frequently and properly. Moths and other pests hate fresh air—so air makes a good preventative. Airing also relaxes fabrics and banishes ordinary wrinkles and creases. Clean clothes also give longer service since moths rarely attack clean garments.

Quick and direct attention is needed for clothes that get wet, and that's a good point to bear in mind this time of the year. Miss Lee cautions against draping a damp coat or dress over a radiator or hanging it in front of a fire. The fabric will buckle and actually get out of shape if you do. Instead, keep it in a cool dry place
