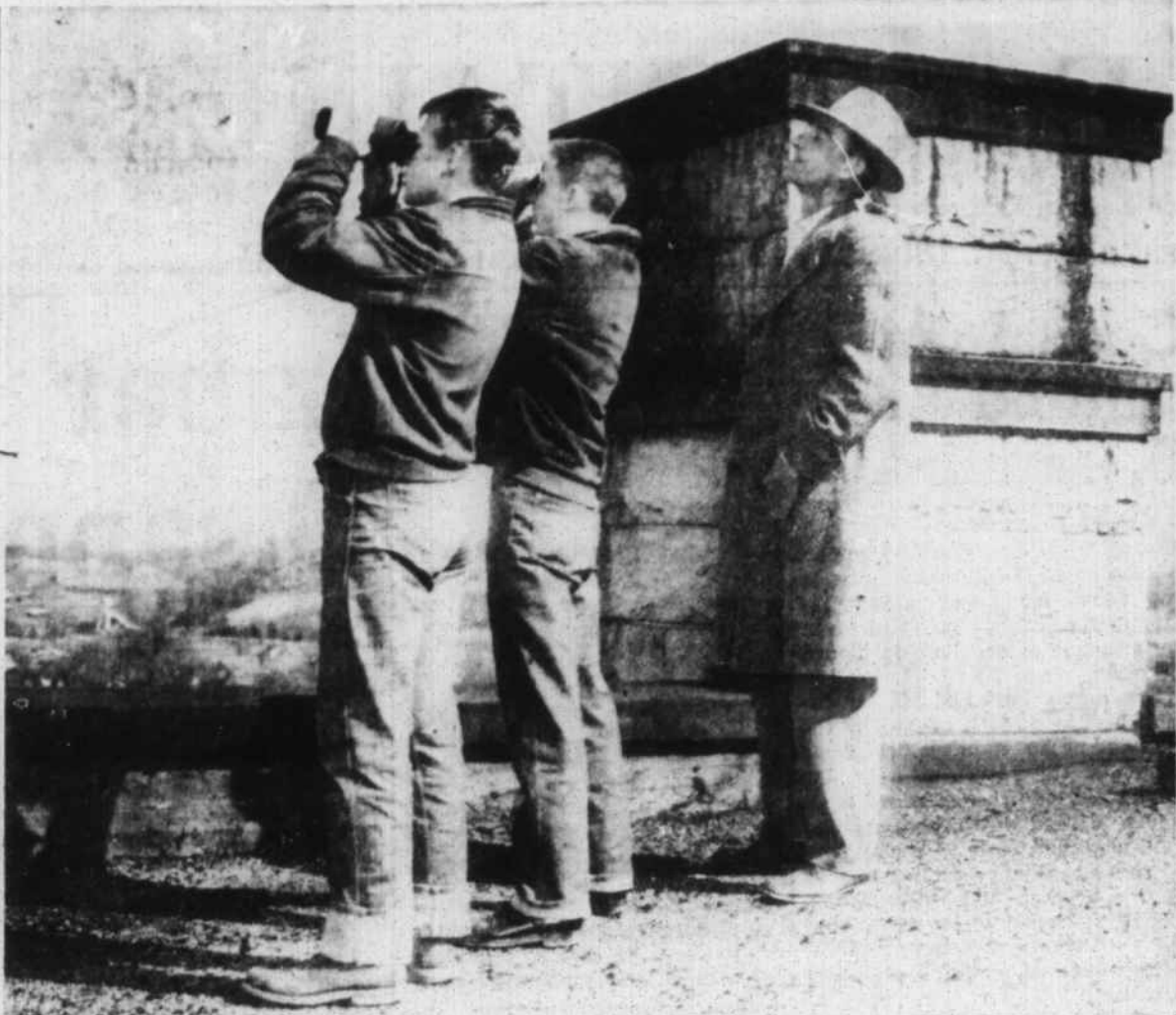

The contention by county farm agents that Haywood farmers can increase their agricultural income by \$2,000,000 with the same pasture and crop land now available was explained by Assistant Agent Steve Cassell Tuesday night at a meeting of the Waynesville Kiwanis Club.

Mr. Cassell explained that the farm agents arrived at their conclusions after an extensive survey, including interviews with a number of county farmers and consultations with various agricultural specialists from N. C. State College.

Increases which could be made to attain the \$2,000,000 figure were listed by Mr. Cassell as:

Tobacco, \$606,015; corn, \$404,000; hay, \$503,040; beef calves, \$267,660; dairying, \$182,557; and poultry, \$82,000.

In recent weeks, Mr. Cassell and County Agent Wayne Franklin have attended a number of CDP meetings throughout the county, using charts and actual food production figures, to explain to farmers how their income can be increased. (Their position was explained at length by Mr. Cassell in a front-page article in last Thursday's Mountaineer.)

Baptist Revival Averages 1004 In Attendance

Record participation was reported by the Haywood Baptist Association in its county-wide revival services last week. Of the 53 Baptist churches in the county, 48 took part, the largest representation on record, the Rev. J. Elmer Greene, Associational Missionary, reported. Average attendance in the combined five churches for each of the four nights of the revival was 1004, with a top attendance of 1062 one night.

Average attendance by preachers at their revival meetings held each morning in the Woodland Baptist Church was 35.

"The results were very gratifying, and we all feel the project was a remarkable success, particularly in terms of what we set out to do," Mr. Greene remarked.

General theme of the entire revival was "Growing Strong Churches." Services for surrounding regions were held nightly in each of these five Baptist churches: Hazelwood, Dellwood, Fines Creek, West Canton, and Spring Hill.

Each of the participating ministers used the following topics each of the four nights: Evangelism, Missions, Stewardship and Advancement Through Dedication of the Individual.

Mr. Greene was assisted in the planning and promotion of the revival by the Rev. C. D. Sawyer and the Rev. W. N. Reece.

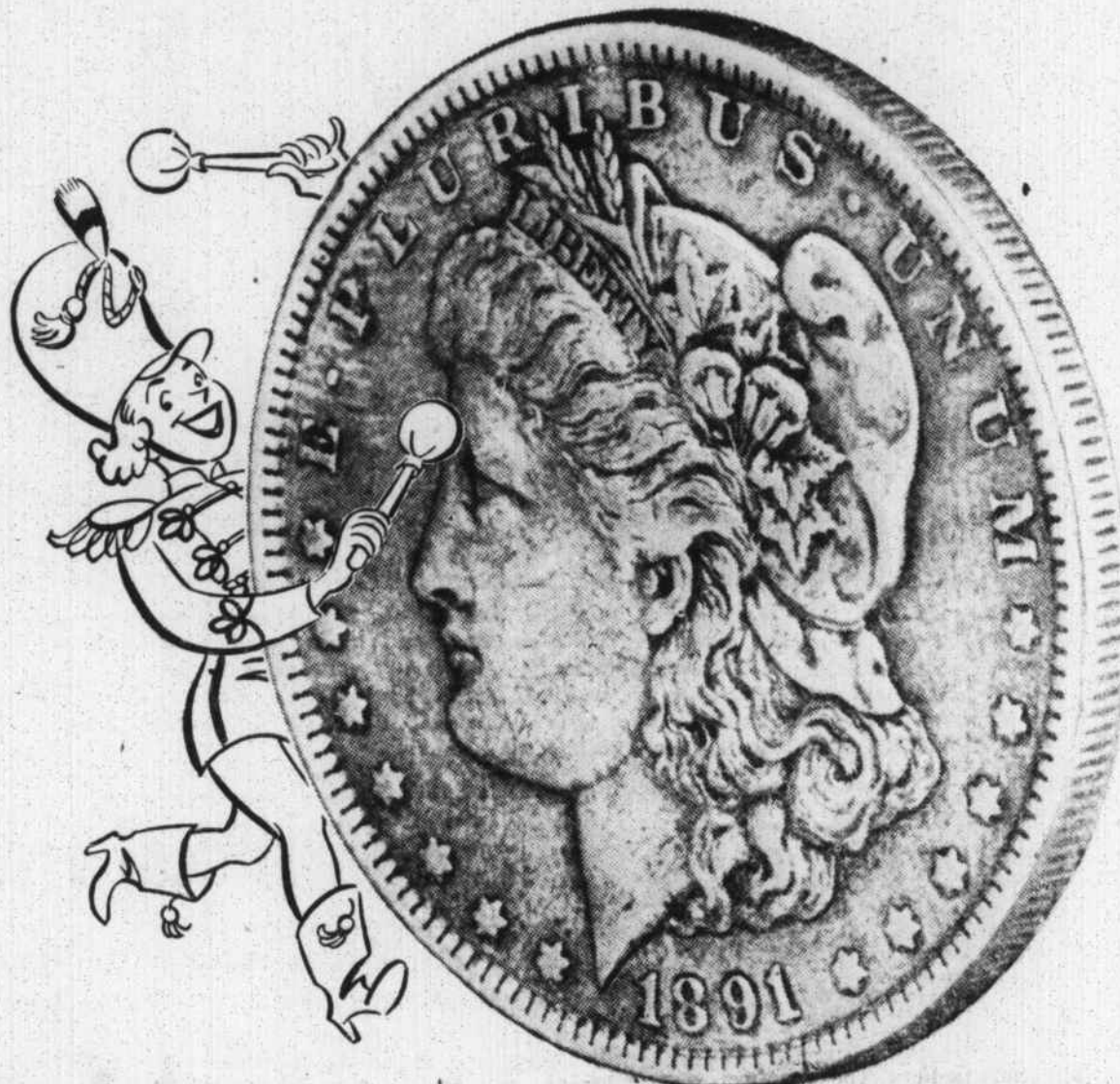

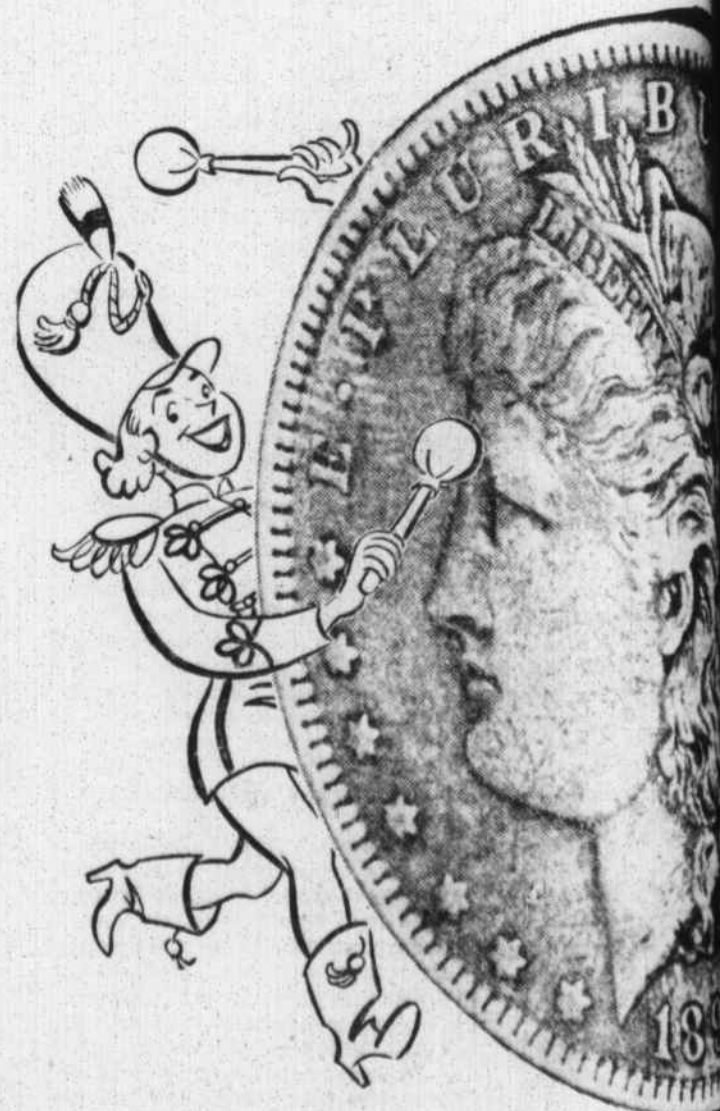
