

#### Buchanan In Letter Tells Of His Plans

Harry E. Buchanan, highway district, told The Mountaineer in a letter yesterday that, "I hope, if funds are available, to let a contract for another link of the Pigeon River Road in 1955."

The statement was part of letter from the highway official, in reply to an editorial published in this newspaper, February 22nd, on the Pigeon River Road.

The commissioner said: "The (highway) engineers have advised me that it is not feasible or practicable to let the contract for another link of the Pigeon River Road until the present contract is completed, which will be sometime

Commissioner Buchanan, also said: "I realize that this (Pigeon River road) is not simply a county road, but that it is an important interstate road, however, as I have previously stated, this road is not eligible for federal aid funds," He also said he would do everything he could to secure additional funds whn they are available for the Pigeon River Road.

The letter in full from the Commissioner, is as follows:

"I read with interest your editorial of Monday afternoon, February 22nd, titled, 'Governor Umstead. Up To Now, Has Ignored Urgent Road Need'

"Your editorial states that the present administrtaion has not seemed the least bit interested in the Pigeon River Road.
