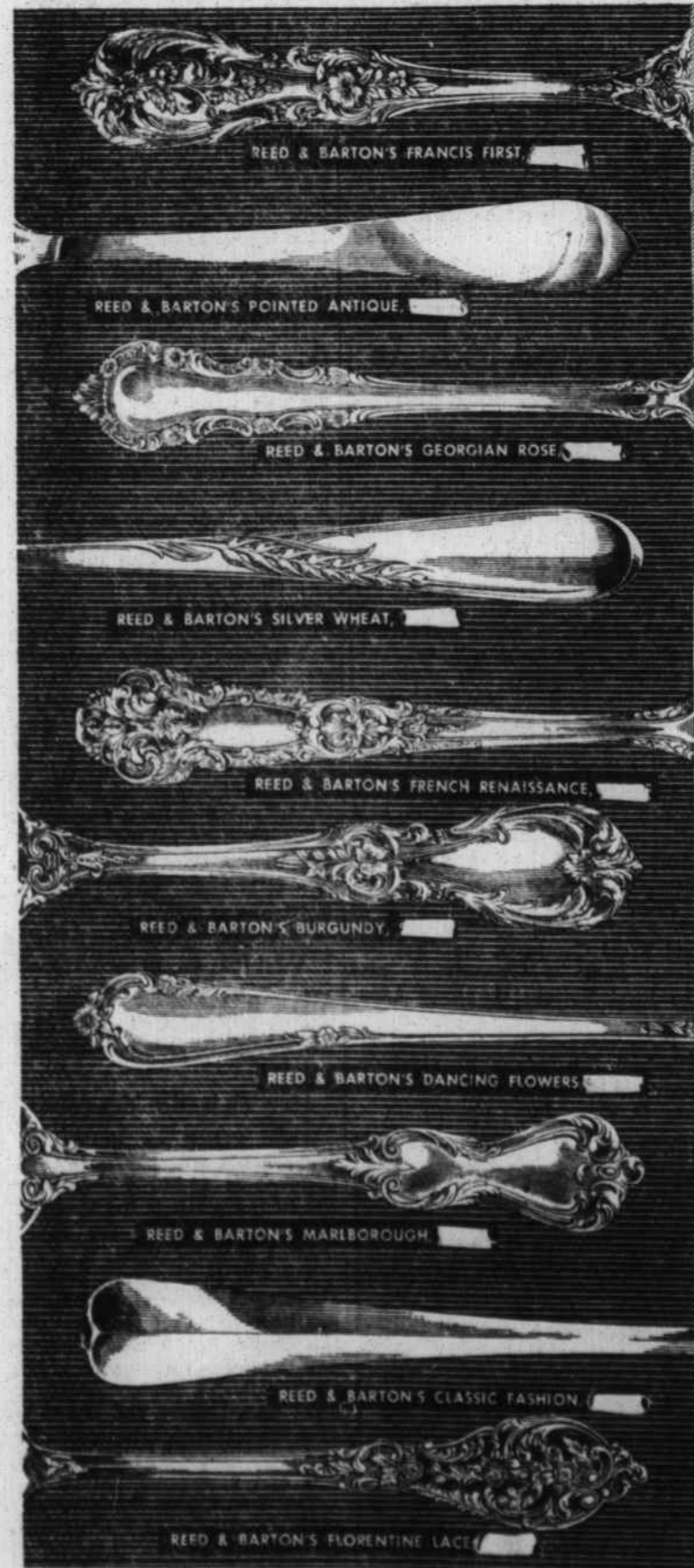
## Junaluska 4-H Club Has Meeting Today
