The Board of Commissioners this afternoon went on record by a vote of two for, and the other not voting, approving participation in the construction of a modern Health Center.

Frank M. Davis made the motion that county funds be put into the 1955 budget to match the twothirds offered by the state and federal agencies for the Construction of a Health Center. The motion was seconded by Chairman C. C. Francis.

Jarvis Allison, third member of the board, did not vote. He explained: "I would like to have two more weeks to study this matter. I am not ready to vote because I need to give the matter further consideration. I would like to hear more from the people."

Commissioner Davis said: "I felt the recent mass meeting held here was very representative, and thus far, I have not heard of any opposition."

Chairman Francis said he had received mail, and telephone calls, and most of them from organizations, and all were favorable for the project.

The chairman continued, right the health of the people is the greatest asset we have, And while the state and federal governments are willing to pay twothirds of the cost, I feel we had better take advantage of their offering, and get a lift."
