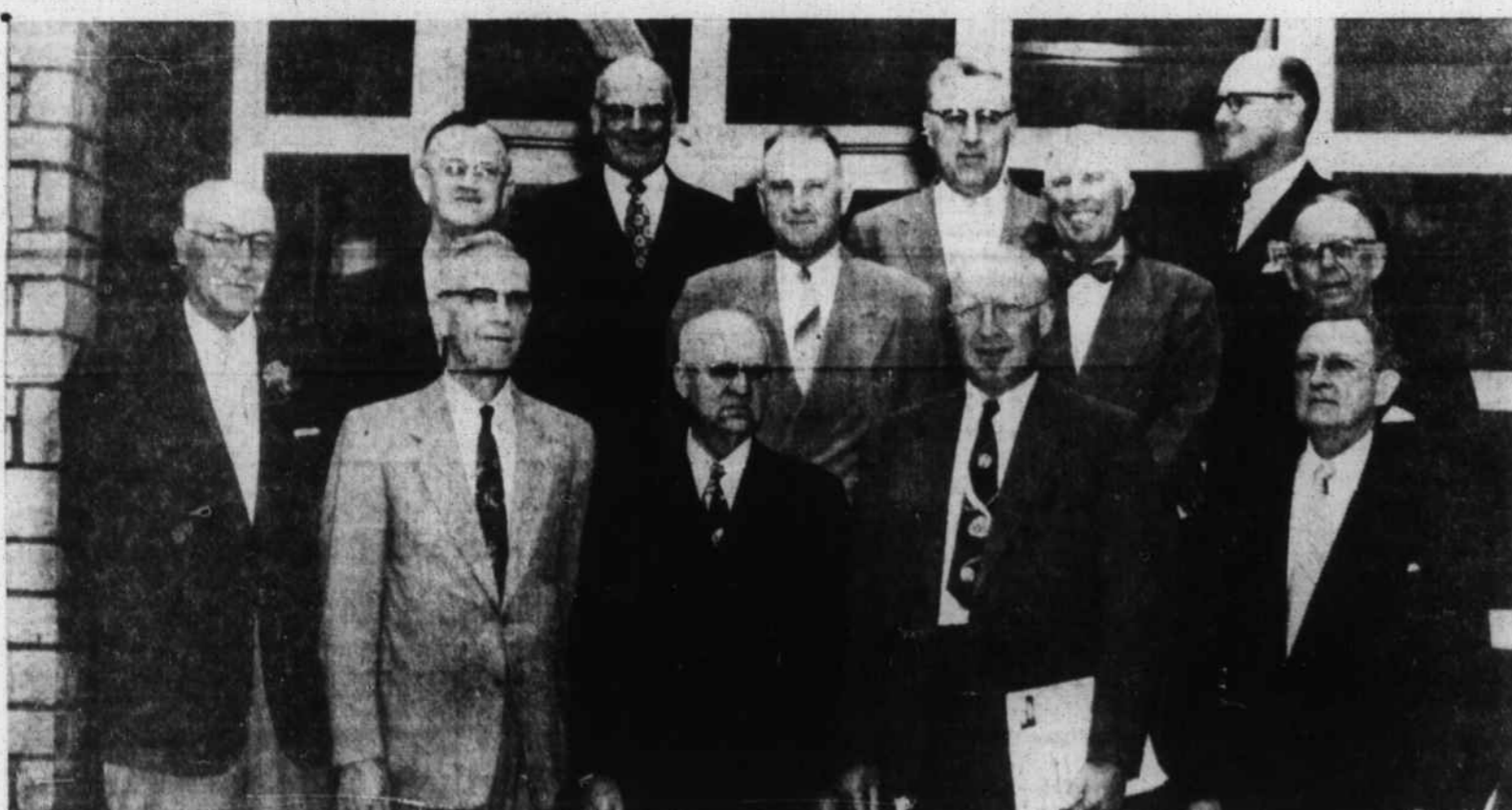

Luther Wallace Shaw, son of Dr. and Mrs. Luther Shaw of Waynesville, received his B. S. Degree from Western Carolina College today.

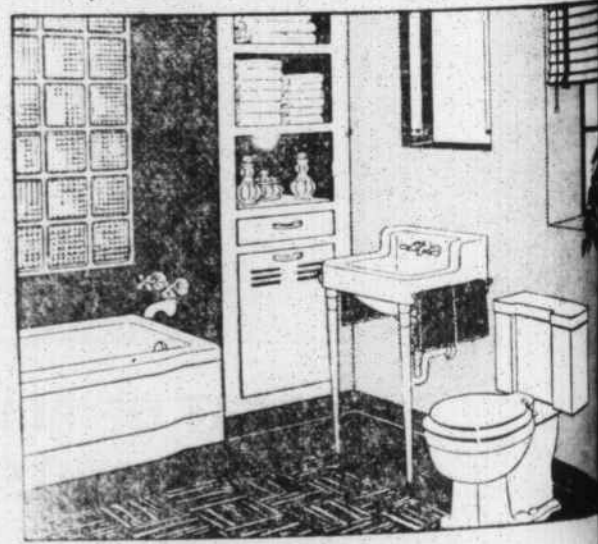
He entered Western Carolina in 1952 after transferring from North Carolina State College in Raleigh.
