County jail. Mrs. Crawford was a devoted mother and grandmother. Following her husband's death, she gave each of her seven children a college education and realized an ambition to give each of them at least one educational trip. One of her own most interesting experiences came at the age of 77 when she took her granddaughter, Ann Coman Crawford on a tour of Europe and made her first airplane trip across the Atlantic en route home. While in Copenhagen she attended the Baptist World Alliance. Mrs. Crawford has long been a member of the Waynesville Woman's Club and the American Legion Auxiliary and displayed an active interest in the progress of the community as it applied to the good of the people. Possessing a fine intellect and a keen sense of humor, Mrs. Crawford never lost interest in world affairs and kept herself informed by reading on a wide scope. One of her friends has said that many a Waynesville gathering has been "graced by Mrs. Crawford's brilliant intellect and ready wit." She was a charter member of the Smoky Mountains National Park Association and one of her most prized possessions was the certificate showing that she made one of the first donations for the realization of the Park. In spite of her full and sacrificial life, Mrs. Crawford found time to follow her hobbies — painting and poetry writing, for which she possessed unusual talent. For two consecutive years she won the silver cup for poetry given by the Federation of Women's Clubs. Mrs. Crawford loved life and lived it to the fullest. She was a "gentlewoman and a Christian."
