## Major Paul Calhoun Is Given Commendation

CAMP TOKYO, JAPAN — Maj. Paul R. Calhoun, whose wife, Elwyn, and parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph A. Calhoun, live on Route 2, Waynesville, recently received the Commendation Ribbon in Japan.

He is serving at Camp Tokyo as property officer in the 8064th Army Unit's quartermaster section.

Major Calhoun was cited for his meritorious services while assigned to the Yokohama Engineer Depot.

"The major supervised the physical inventory of 675,000 tons of supplies," his citation states in part, "including thousands of items, many of which were unclassified and unidentified."

A 1933 graduate of Eastman College, Poughkeepsie, N. Y., the major is a member of Phi Sigma Chi fraternity. Calhoun, a manager and buyer with the S. S. Kresge firm in Detroit before entering the Army in 1942, served in Europe during World War II. He has been in the Far East since May 1952.

## Two Haywood Men On Aircraft Carrier In

Marine Pfc. Beauford S. Gilliland, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry R. Gilliland, and Marine Pfc. Charles T. Gaddy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Turner Gaddy of Route 3, both of Waynesville, are aboard the support aircraft carrier USS Leyte, participating in a major anti-submarine development exercise.

The training began on April 26 and involves over 50 air, surface, and submarine units operating in the area between Bermuda and the Bahamas. Designated ASDEVEX 1-54, the operation was planned and scheduled by the Operational Development Force, U. S. Atlantic Fleet, under the command of Rear Admiral Harold D. Baker, USN, to explore the tactical application of specific new developments in anti-submarine warfare. The exercise covers the various phases of convoy protection and detection of submarines by Hunter-Killer Groups.

## Revised Plan Submitted For Viaduct At Canton

A revised plan for the construction of a viaduct at Canton has been submitted to Canton officials by representatives of the State Highway and Public Works Commission.

According to Harry E. Buchanan, 14th District highway commissioner, the new plan eliminates a number of the difficulties faced under the old plan.

Mr. Buchanan conferred with Canton officials, last week, along with R. Getty Browning, chief location engineer for the Highway Department; G. G. Page, division highway engineer, and Paul J. Dupre, district highway engineer.

The proposed new route will:

A. Eliminate the Southern Railroad from the plan.

(1) Not necessary to cut back hill on North side of railroad tracks, east of Bridge street, or to purchase house thereon.

(2) Not necessary to re-locate railroad tracks.

(3) Not necessary to re-locate Southern depot and only move slightly the team track at the lumber yard.

B. Leave Main street open across Southern Railway tracks.

C. Eliminate hazard of double-crossing (Highway and Railroad tracks) on Main street.

D. Leave cross-town streets undisturbed.

E. Avail maximum restriction for new 19-23 highway (less exits-entrances, traffic interference).

F. Possibly effect enough savings in the purchase of property, relocations of railroad tracks and depot to off-set some additional

1. Starting point—eastern town limits line.

a) Zero elevation at railroad grade crossing, Oak street to present 19-23 highway.

2. Follow the present route to apex of hill (to be modified per paragraph 3). Obtain desired width by locating new highway as close to Southern Railway tracks as possible, and by constructing (if proposed to have crossing at same level. This would be the second intersection in the Town of Canton, the other at Bridge street).

Mr. Buchanan further stated the map of the entire survey through Canton had been left with the mayor, the Town Board and the special committee so that all theizens of Canton could inspect it.
