Mrs. Shelley Is New Secretary Of Methodist Women

Mrs. Ira C. Shelley, Greensboro, was installed Saturday night as secretary of the Methodist Wesleyan Service Guild, Western North Carolina Conference, at the group's annual meeting at Lake Junaluska.

She succeeds Miss Annabel Thompson, also of Greensboro, who presided over the sessions at the Methodist assembly grounds. Miss Thompson, who has headed the organization for four years, becomes associate secretary.

The secretaryship is the highest office of the guild, composed of employed members of the Woman's Society of Christian Service. More than 225 delegates attended the meeting, representing 4,622 members of 155 guilds in the conference.

In their annual pledge service WSG members subscribed \$38,000 to the world-wide program of the Woman's Division of the Methodist Board of Missions. The pledge last year was \$27,459, plus \$15,000 raised for social relations and local church activities.

"Guild members are Christian women who go about their daily tasks in the work-a-day world rubbing shoulders with people of all types, creeds and color... our aim is to stir a desire in all of them to make Jesus Christ the way," Miss Thompson said in her annual report.

The guild ended its meeting Sunday morning with the observance of Holy Communion in Memorial Chapel, and a sacrificial offering to help build a Methodist home in Korea for teen-age girls.

Mrs. Wallace Ford of Lake Junaluska headed the Waynesville delegation. She is WSG district president, having succeeded Mrs. Florence Sherrill of Franklin.

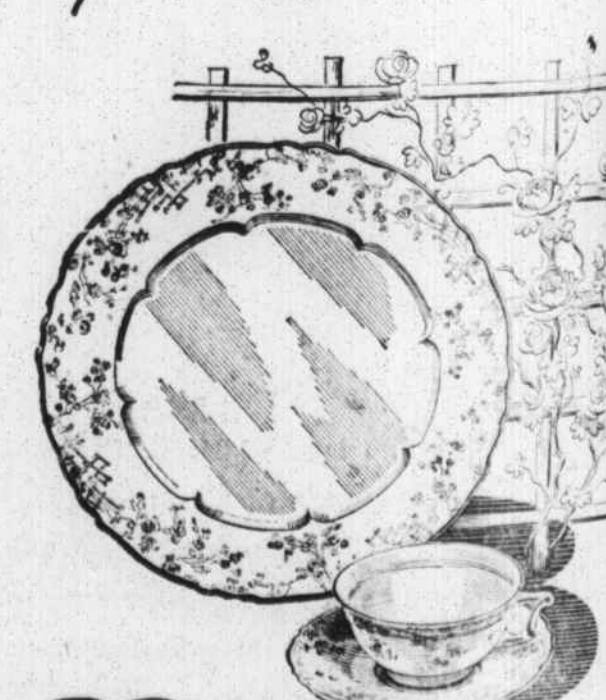
Miss Ray Ballard, Lake Junaluska, served as organist at meetings of both the guild and the WNC WSCS.
