Clarence Baxter Haynes, 72, noted educator of Inman, S. C., died Thursday night in Spartanburg General Hospital after an illness of several months.

Mr. Haynes was born in Haywood County, the son of the late M. L. and Addie Jones Haynes. His paternal grandfather was Posey Haynes of Fines Creek and his maternal grandmother was Peggy McCracken of Crabtree.

He received his A.B. degree from the University of South Carolina in 1908 and immediately began a long and outstanding career in public school education. He served as superintendent of Inman schools for 30 years before retiring in 1947.

Mr. Haynes was an active charter member of the Inman Rotary Club and had served several times as a member of the board of deacons of Inman Baptist Church.

Funeral services were held in the Inman Baptist Church. Surviving are the wife, Mrs. Edna Cox Haynes; one daughter, Mrs. Edna Hill Haynes Hammock of Waynesville; three sisters, Mrs. A. G. Goodman and Mrs. Ann Justus, both of Asheville, and Mrs. Paul Clyde.

since the early crystal set days of the industry. He has built a number of stations from coast to coast, and served as assistant to the president of the Wilder Radio Stations. Later he was with the Headley Reed radio representatives in New York, and for a time served as sales manager of CBS. He resigned his position in 1948 to build WUSN in Charleston, and became manager of WHKP in Hendersonville in 1950. He is a member of Rotary, Elks, the American Legion and the Episcopal church.

Kermit Edney is vice president and manager of the station. He is a graduate of the School of Radio, University of North Carolina, attended Texas A & M, Valparaiso Technical Institute, Sacramento College. He began as an announcer in 1946. Champion Chemist Stresses Importance Of Water To U.S.

The extreme importance of water resources in American economy—

particularly in Haywood County—was emphasized at a meeting of the Kiwanis Club Tuesday night by Fred V. Doult, chief chemist of the Champion Paper and Fibre Company plant at Canton.

Mr. Doult called water "the one fundamental necessary for life" and pointed out that "there is nothing living which is not dependent upon water."

Water is also a prime requisite in manufacturing, he said, and is used extensively in the great majority of industrial processes.

"Water is also our cheapest utility," the speaker asserted, "and because of its cheapness, it is continually wasted by the American people."
