My Favorite Stories

This is the story of how Major A. L. Fletcher, Raleigh businessman, and John Mitchell, cashier of the State Bank and Trust Company of Greenville, were expelled from Wake Forest College a number of years ago.

The scheme, that brought about this action, was a very ingenious one, as we think you'll agree. If it had worked out as originally planned everybody probably would have been highly elated; that is, everybody except Dr. George Washington Paschal, who taught Latin at the college in those days, and still lives in Wake Forest.

Every morning, the student body would march into chapel for a brief religious service. The faculty always sat on the platform, and invariably Dr. Paschal would lead the delegation. He always marched across the rostrum and took his seat at the extreme west side.

Some of the boys had it in for Dr. Paschal. Either that, or else he was just the innocent victim of circumstances. At any rate, right in the middle of the platform was the baptistry. For the benefit of you folks who are not Baptists, we'll explain and say that the baptistry is the little pool where all good Baptists get dunked. It was covered over with a wooden lid something like a huge door. On top of it was a rug.

Arthur and John, and possibly

two or three others—even at this late date the two arch-conspirators refuse to snitch—stole into the chapel late at night. They threw the rug to one side, lifted the heavy cover and placed it somewhere in the rear, where it wouldn't be seen. Then they filled the pool with water and placed two or three very light strips of wood across the top; just enough to bear the weight of the rug, which they carefully replaced in its original position. To look at it, you couldn't possibly have told that the baptistry had been tampered with.

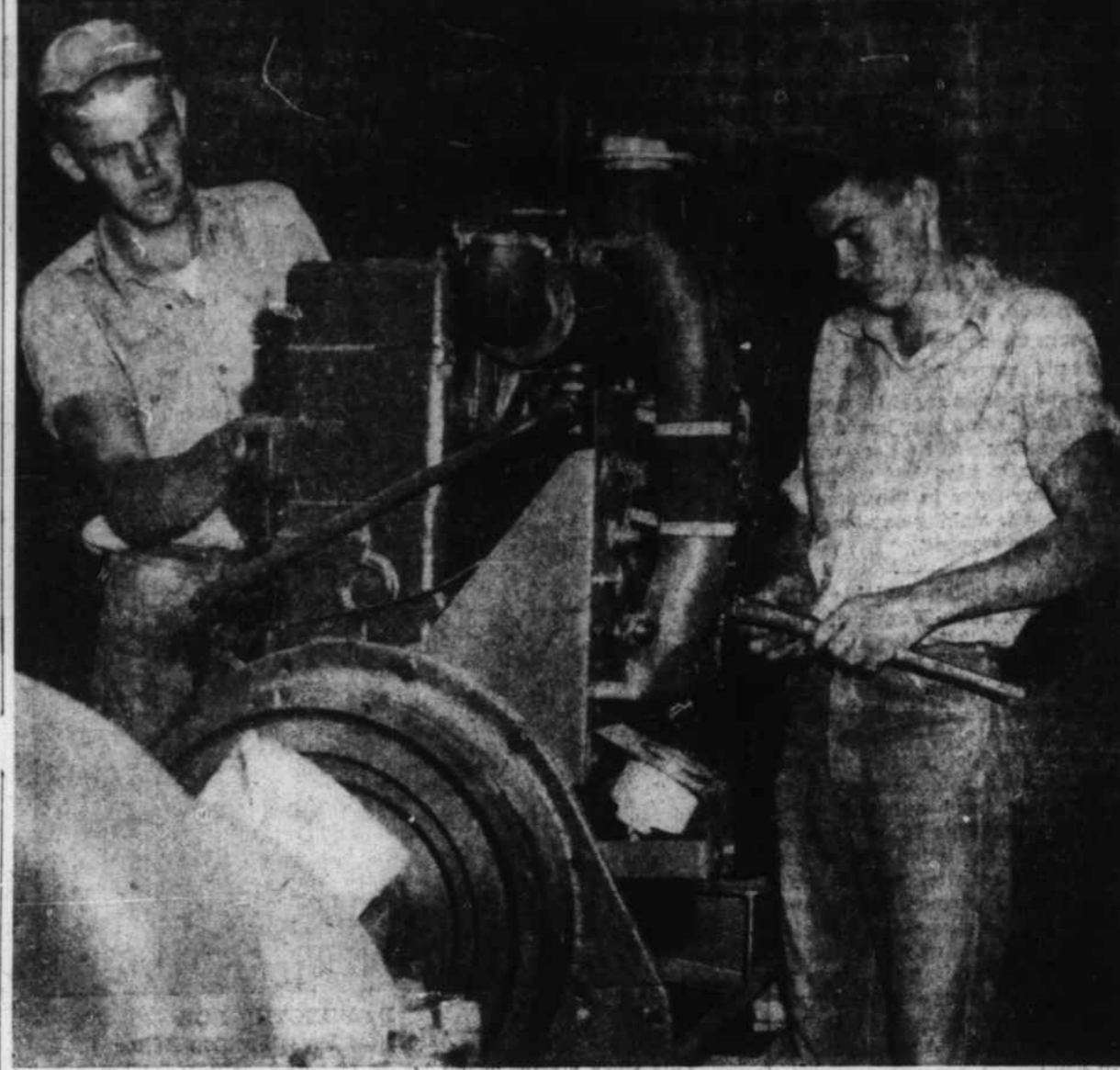
Of course, you realize what was expected to happen. The students would file into chapel and take their seats. In a moment, the faculty, headed by Dr. Paschal, would march across the platform, heading for their respective seats. As the learned Doctor's foot struck the rug, he would suddenly shoot downward into the water-filled pool and the ensuing spectacle would be one to delight the eyes, ears and mind of any normal college boy.

You've got to admit that it really was a wonderful scheme. And even though we have the highest regard and respect for Dr. Paschal, we're sorry that the thing didn't work out the way the boys had planned.

But fate intervened. The matron of the college at that time was an elderly lady by the name of Mrs. Vann. She's been dead a number of years, but all of the boys thought the world of her and—naturally—wouldn't have done anything to hurt her.

Mrs. Vann went into the chapel the next morning before services and walked across the platform to straighten up things just a little bit. She stepped on the rug, shot downward into the pool of water, broke her arm and like to have drowned. Well sir, there was a terrible furore about it. The chain of circumstantial evidence pointed to several boys who hadn't had anything to do with it, so Messrs. Fletcher and Mitchell finally made a full confession. They were summarily dismissed from college. Arthur went to the University and subsequently went back to Wake Forest and obtained his A.B. degree, magna cum laude. John stuck 't out at the University for a while, but he never went back to Wake Forest. Mrs. Vann has gone to her reward, and Dr. Paschal celebrated his 85th birthday the other day. It has been said of him that he never steps on a rug without first testing it out to be sure that it will bear his weight. There were several others besides Arthur and John who were involved in the scrape, but there was so much stir about the proposition that their names never became known.
