Department Of Agriculture Now Inspecting Dog Food

WASHINGTON—Now shoppers for dog food can look for a government inspection label to be sure of high quality food containing all nutrients a dog needs for good health, the Department of Agriculture tells us. The keystone-shaped design on the label carries the words "Inspected and certified by U. S. Department of Agriculture as a normal maintenance dog food." This means that federal inspectors have checked both quality and type of ingredients and that all information on the label is accurate—just like the food inspected for humans. However, the Department of Agriculture says that the label does not state that the food is safe besides the listing of the net weight of the food and address of the manufacturer.
