Charles Haynie and Peggy Nor-'is will do a lot of solo singing of mountain ballads,


Fred Roper and his family trio have been booked for several numbers during the afternoon. Other nusical groups are being contacted e round out the full platform proram, Ferguson said.


The doors to the show will be swung open at two, and continue until four o'clock, Mrs. Rodgers announced.
