Lincoln Tombstone  
Found

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP) — The  
lost tombstone of Eddie Lincoln,  
second son of Abraham Lincoln  
and Mary Todd Lincoln, has been  
found after being missing for 89  
years. Dr. Harry E. Pratt, Illinois  
State historian, says the white  
marble slab was found face down  
and serving as an entrance stone  
to the burial as an entrance stone  
Edwards, Illinois' third governor,  
and his descendants in Oak Ridge  
Cemetery.

Edward Baker Lincoln died Feb.  
1, 1850, a little more than a month  
before his fourth birthday. He was  
buried in Hutchinson's Cemetery,  
eight blocks west of Springfield's  
public square. In 1865, following  
the assassination of President Lin-  
coln, Edward's body was moved to  
the temporary Lincoln tomb in  
Oak Ridge, beside the bodies of  
his father, and brother, William.  
When the present tomb was finish-  
ed it was placed there.

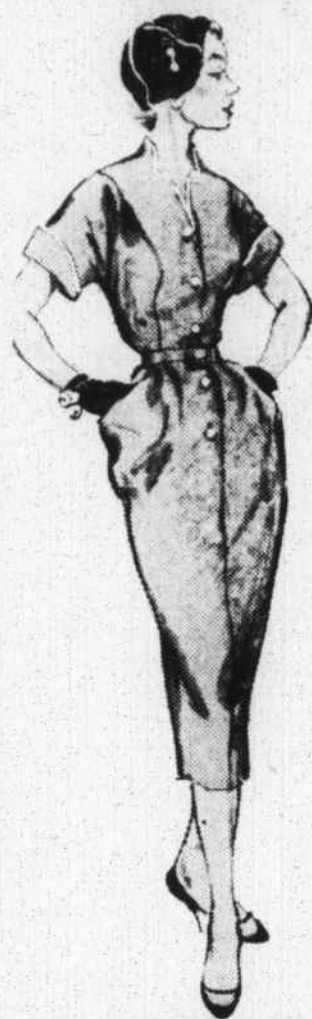
Mrs. Lincoln, later in 1865, gave  
Eddie's original tombstone to her  
eldest sister, Elizabeth Todd Ed-  
wards, wife of Ninian Wirt Ed-  
wards, son of the governor. Mrs.  
Edwards had it moved to Oak  
Ridge and the name "Edwards"  
engraved on it. Dr. Pratt said.
