students.

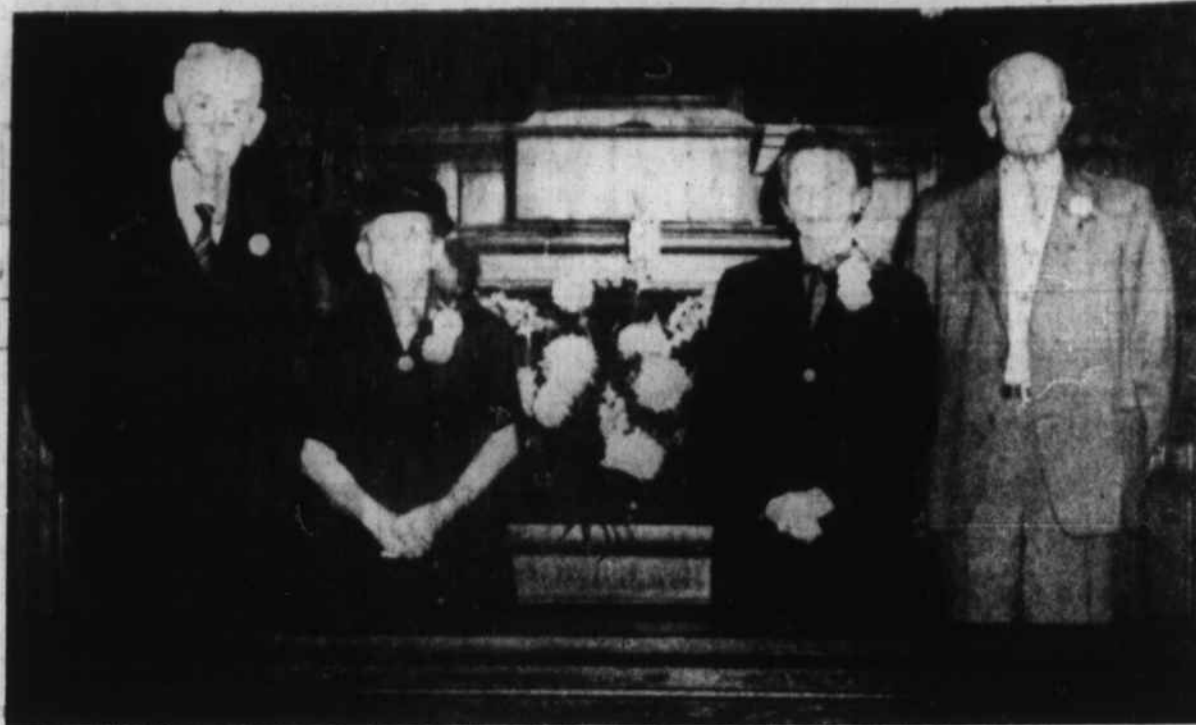

Happy Ending

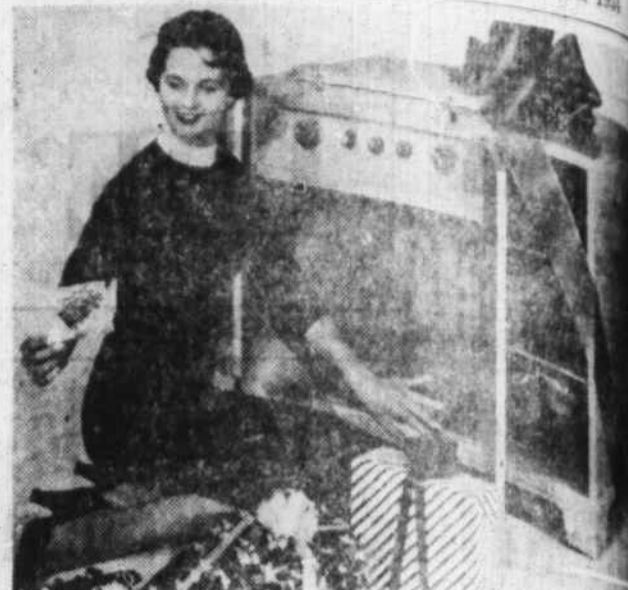
