Refresher Course Is Planned For **Practical Nurses**

A 64-hour refresher course for licensed practical nurses will be given shortly after the first of the year, according to Mrs. Lura Davis, president of Division One of the North Carolina Licensed Practical Nurses Association.

The objectives of the course will be to extend the knowledge of experinced practical nurses in order to provide adequate and safe care of patients.

The course is set up and approved by the National Association for Practical Nurse Education and is sponsored by the N. C. Division of Vocational Education and the Superintendent of Public Schools.

Mrs. Davis urges that all licensed practical nurses take advantage of the course. Grades will be sent to the Board of Nurse Examiners, Enlarged at Raleigh and will become a part of the permanent record of persons completing the course.

The program is being set up over the state in order to bring licensed practical nurses who received their license under the waiver, in line with nurses graduating from the schools of practical nurses.
