Canton Ends Mountaineer Win Streak 63-42; WTHS Girls Team Triumphs

Last season the Canton High basketball team had Charlie Carpenter. This year they've got five "Charlie Carpenters" and their combined impact on the Waynesville Mountaineers resulted in a 63-42 win for the tall and terrific Black Bears here Friday night.

However, the talented Mountaineers brought joy to local hearts by easily besting the Canton Lady Bears in the lid litter, 54-37.

Except for a short time in the first quarter when they held an 8-7 edge, the Mountaineers trailed throughout the contest. However, they kept the margin fairly respectable until midway in the third quarter when the smooth-passing, hard-driving Bears broke the game wide open with a flurry of layups, tip-ins, and push shots.

In the fourth quarter, Waynesville's defense—never too impressive—virtually collapsed and the remainder of the game was little more than a practice session for Canton.

The bruins' airtight zone defense kept the Gold and Black way out in the suburbs the entire game where they were unable to hit enough long shots to save the day. In comparison, Canton was never forced to try any long-distance sharpshooting, but continually drove through the WTHS defenses to tap the ball in the basket.

The Mountaineers hit 11 out of 24 foul shots; the bruins caged 16 out of 29. Canton held leads of 15-8 at the end of the first quarter, 24-16 at the half, and 40-26 at the end of the third quarter.

Joe Aldridge led WTHS with 15 points, while Jimmy Harris collected 10. Four Canton starters hit in the double figures, with Gerald Milner getting 13 and brother DeWayne 12.

In the girls game, the unbeaten Waynesville Mountaineers had too much polish for the Lady Bears and were out in front throughout the game.

Tulan Carver, under-the-basket specialist, dumped in 24 points, while freshman Agnes Roberson tallied 16. Jean Surratt was high for Canton with 20 points.

Waynesville led 10-8 at the end of the first quarter, 27-16 at the half, and 45-23 at the end of three.

Now in possession of a 7-0 record, the Mountaineers will meet their sternest challenge of the season Thursday night against the powerful Bethel Belles in the first game in the new Bethel gymnasium.

Next game for both WTHS squads will be Tuesday night at Hendersonville.

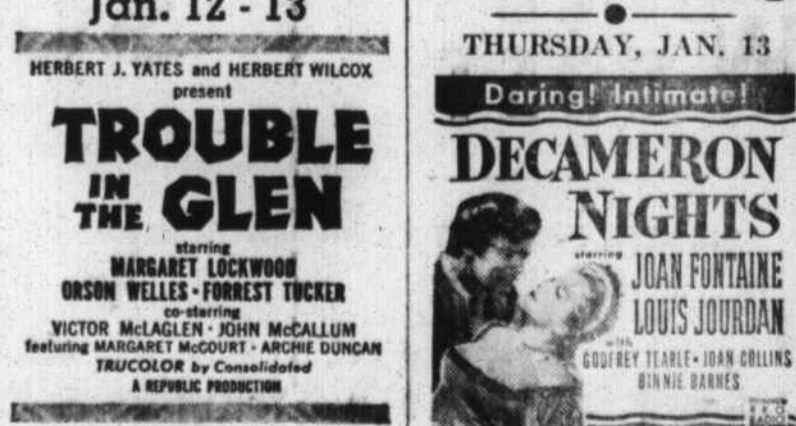
