Rat Paradise

SPRINGFIELD, Ohio (AP) -Pampered rats are an industry in Springfield. Their handlers speak softly and decorously to them. Their food is sterile. Their air is rigorously policed for hostile organisms. Temperatures and humidity are kept at constant levels.

Antiseptic rats, produced by John M. Rolfsmeyer, are used as living test tubes by scientists. 'A rat in three weeks completes

the cycle which takes a human an entire year," Rolfsmeyer says. Their reaction to many foods and PILLOW CASES drugs are similar to those in man, Visitors to Rolfsmeyer's rat ranch doff their coats and dip

their shoes in antiseptic water before entering. These measures will be tightened after he enlarges the building to increase his 1,000rat herd 15-fold. Then workers will bathe and don sterilized clothing before entering.

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
