Cpl. S. Sentelle Home After 18 Months In Korea

"I just want to sit and rest," said Cpl. Stuart Sentelle, a few hours after he arrived home from 18 months of duty in Korea.

"Right now I'm trying to get my car in shape to take off with my wife for a month in Florida. I plan to make some decision during my stay in the Florida sun," he said.

Cpl. Sentelle, a graduate of Bethel high in 1951, was a student at Warren Wilson College when he entered the service in October 1953. Six months later he was in Korea, after just a 6-month training at Fort Jackson. Whether he will go back to college is one of the decisions he is to soon make.

The ship Cpl. Sentelle was returning home on from Korea had engine trouble and they were 32 days enroute home. He came from the West Coast to Fort Jackson by train.

The new Bethel school, and the highway through Pigeon Gap, and the 4-lane highway to Canton amazed Cpl. Sentelle. "All this was built up while I was away, and I never realized just how many other changes had been made."

Cpl. Sentelle has four medals—National Defense, Korean Service, Good Conduct, and United Nations.

Cpl. Sentelle is the son of Mrs. Charles Harris Sentelle and the late Mr. Sentelle.

County To Seek 100 Pct. Vehicle-Inspection Total

Haywood County will be out for a 100 per cent registration of motor vehicles when the county's voluntary auto inspection program gets under way in May, Chief of Police Orville Noland told the Waynesville Kiwanis Club Tuesday night.

When the program starts, Haywood County will be competing against 10 other areas in North Carolina as a part of a nation-wide voluntary inspection campaign. Prizes will be awarded to U. S. winners.

The highest figure reported in the state thus far, the chief said, is 68 per cent.

Waynesville was originally designated to enter the contest but since the drive is usually made county-wide in towns with less than 10,000 population, it was decided to include all of Haywood.

Committees have been appointed for both the Waynesville and Canton areas to administer the program. Checking lanes will be set up. Chief Noland said, but vehicle owners also will be encouraged to go to their own garages where inspections will be made free of charge.

Owners of cars and trucks will be given one inspection report and urged to have any defects corrected. Another copy of the report will be kept by the checking lanes or

Suburban Growth

RETROIT (AP)—The population of Detroit's suburbs should pass that of the city proper by 1960 according to estimates of the Detroit Regional Planning Commission. Latest commission figures put Detroit's total at 1,894,000 and the combined suburbs at 1,506,000.

Chief Noland said that Waynesville has 1,100 motor vehicles registered and Hazelwood has approximately 300. The present county total is not known, but officials here have written to Raleigh requesting that information.

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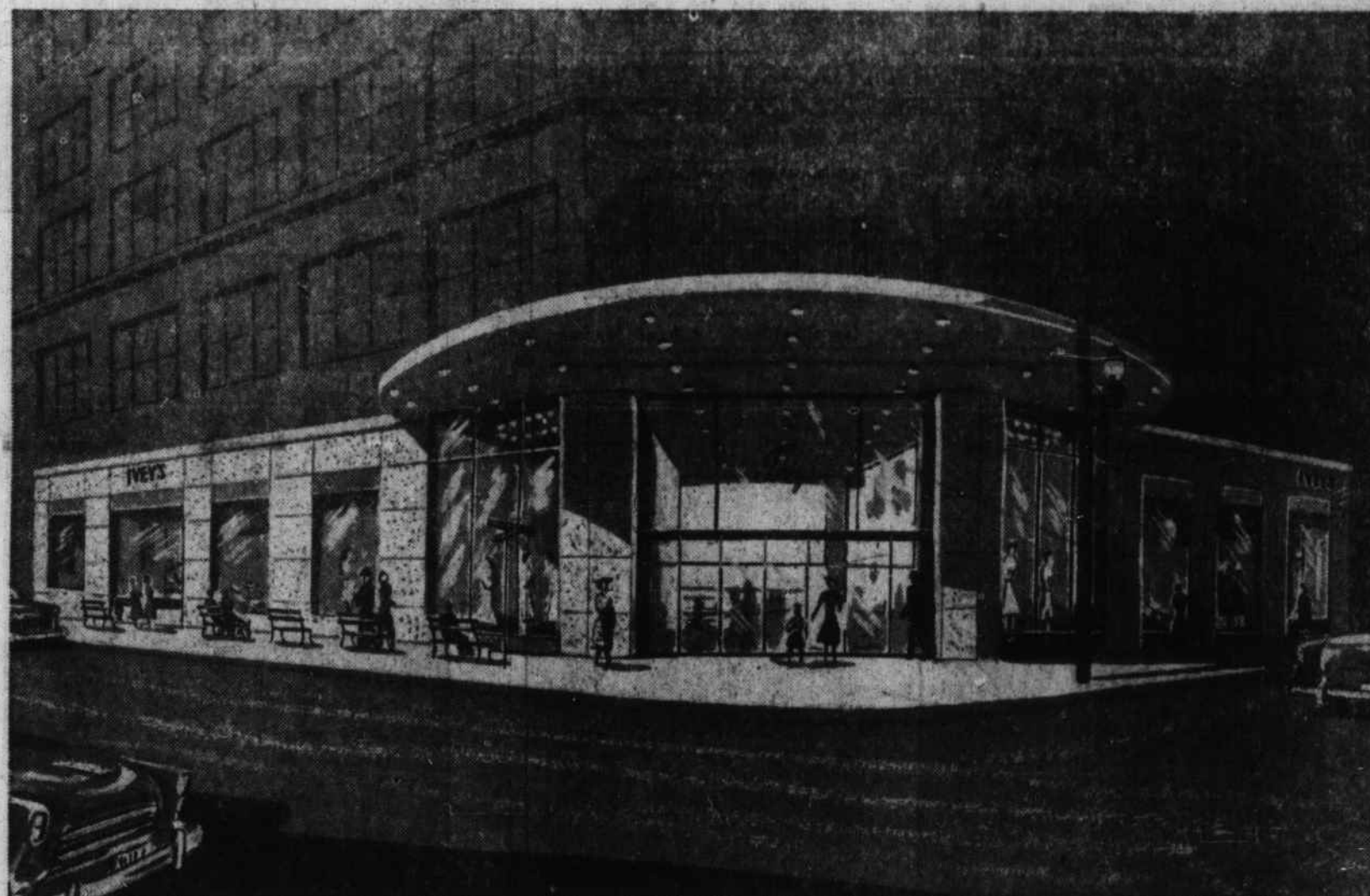
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
