

Should Reckless Youth

Be Permitted to Drive?

IT'S amazing how readily parents will sign a child's application for a driver's license or car ownership, when they know he is a careless, dangerous driver. Many of them haven't the courage to say No; yet once the youth has the license, his parents may have no power to revoke it.

On April 20, however, Governor

The bill requires the State Motor Vehicles Commission to revoke a junior license if one parent withdraws his or her consent. Once it is revoked, the junior license can't be reissued for thirty days.

It's not just a matter of the parents' peace of mind, but of effective education of the youth in safe driving. If he goes on as a heedless, reckless driver in his parents' presence, how likely will he be to drive safely when he is on his own?

New York State had nothing to say about whether a child between 16 and 18 years of age could continue to hold a license. To my knowledge, this still holds true in all other states. Of course courts have, on occasion, revoked licenses at the request of parents.
