

The Haywood team composed of Arnold Phillips of White Oak, Tom Garrett of Saunook, George Kirkpatrick of Crabtree-Iron Duff, and Tommy Davis of White Oak won the contest with 1,498 out of a possible 1,800 points. Buncombe County was second with 1,494

Phillps scored 519 points out of possible 600, Garrett had 490, Kirkpatrick 489, and Davis 457. Coach of the Haywood team is Cecil Brown, assistant home agent.

The top individual scorer in the contest was a girl-Peggy Ann Carroll, who amassed 532 points for Buncombe County.
