In charge of the institute program are Miss Lena J. Martin, an associate in child welfare at the Chicago board; Miss Emma Burris, executive secretary of social welfare and medical work for the Woman's Division of the missions board, and William I. Lacy of the Chicago board.

Miss Martin said the program emphasis is on leadership training for the house-parents, and administrative details for the superintendents. Special speakers include Bishop Lloyd C. Wicke of Pittsburgh, Pa., and Dr. Earl P. Meister, executive secretary of the Chicago board.

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Choral Concert And Hymn Festival Set Friday At Lake Junaluska Auditorium

A choral concert and hymn festival at 8 p.m. Friday under the direction of Dr. John Milton Kelly will conclude the first term of the seventh annual South-wide Institute of Church Music at the Lake Junaluska Methodist summer assembly.

Three choirs will take part in the choral concert: the festival choir of 80 voices, conducted by Dr. Kelly; the youth choir, of 25 voices, conducted by Dr. J. Edward Moyer; and the children's choir of 30 voices, conducted by Mrs. Kelly. Accompanists will be Frances Moyer and Eugenia Toole.

The congregation will participate in one of the anthems as well as have the opportunity of joining in a good, old-fashioned hymn sing. Members of the youth choir and the children's choir have been drawn largely from residents of Lake Junaluska.

The Institute, which has an enrollment of 75, for the first term, is a co-operative project of the Southeastern Jurisdiction and the Division of the Local Church, Methodist Board of Education, Nashville, Tenn. However, the attendance is not confined to workers in the Southeastern Jurisdiction. Persons from a dozen or more states are registered for the School.

Leaders of the school are Prof. Cyrus Daniel, head of the Institute and director of music at Vanderbilt University, Nashville, Tenn.;
