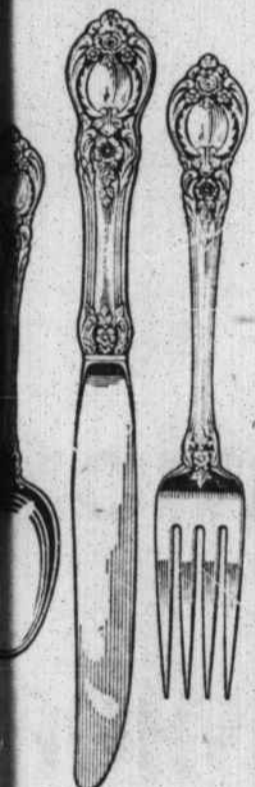

### Three Young Men Bound To Court For Taking Gas

Three young men were bound over to Superior Court under \$300 bond on charges of taking gasoline from a truck and tractor on Dix Creek Tuesday night.

Sheriff Fred Campbell said his office received a call about 11:30 from Bruton S. Blalock, of Dix Creek, saying "five persons in a car" had fled after taking gas from two of his motor vehicles.

Deputy Sheriff Gene Howell went to the scene, and started an investigation. A short time later he found the car with the five passengers on the Cruso road. Two of the occupants were minors, and

were turned over to J. B. Siler, judge of juvenile court, the others were arrested and later confessed.

Blalock told the officers that he had been missing gasoline off and on, and was on the lookout for such persons. Sheriff Campbell said Blalock fired a warning shot at the young men, as they fled. One of the men said some of the shot hit a tree and then struck his hand.

Sheriff Campbell said he was having a lot of complaints from residents of the county about losing gasoline from cars and trucks.

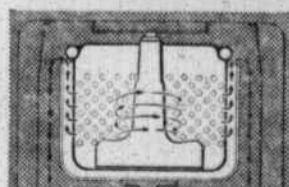
