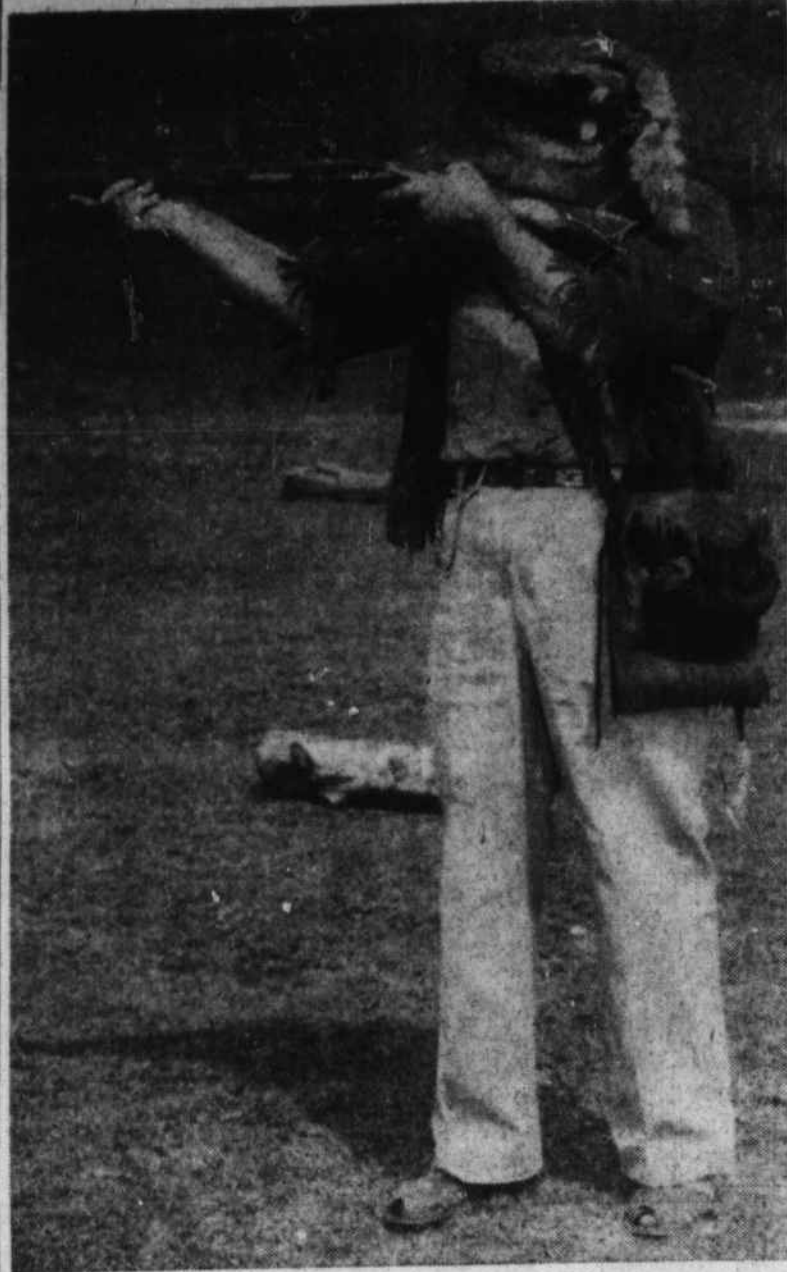

The bond election will be held in both Waynesville and Hazelwood, and in order for the proposition to carry must be approved by the majority of voters participating in the election.

Waynesville voters will vote on issuance of \$136,500 in bonds and Hazelwood \$38,500. Both make the \$175,000 total, and are on a pro rata basis.
