

Garden Club To Present Flower Show August 17

MIDSUMMER IN THE MOUNTAINS, a flower and vegetable show, will be presented by the Richland Garden Club, Wednesday, August 17 in the new high school cafeteria on Brown Avenue. The hours will be from 3 p.m. until 10 p.m.
