

New Atom Smasher

ANN ARBOR, Mich, (AP)-They are trying something new in atom smashing at the University of Michigan. Eight midwest universities-Michigan, Illinois, Iowa, Insin and Iowa State, are sending scientists to work on a model atom smasher combining two old principles which never have been used together.

The model will use a fised magnetic field through which the atomic particles will move. Then oddly-shaped magnets will be stationed along the way to keep them on the track. They hope to produe more particles and move them faster than in present ma-


