From Garrett Furniture on Wall Street to Rogers Electric Company on Main Street, should be designated a one-way street to allow Wall Street traffic to enter Main Street.

These recommendations made in view of the narrow streets involved. Neither of them are wide enough to carry two lanes of traffic and the corner of Garrett Furniture Store, both on Main Street and Wall Street, are very hazardous.

6. In order to relieve the conjesting of parked cars on Wall Street and to eliminate the fire hazard involved when automobiles are parked too close to the rear of these buildings making it impossible for fire equipment to function properly in case of fire in one be constructed along this street for cars to park against. A temporary curb made out of logs would serve the purpose. Alley ways to the back of these stores should be well marked and kept open for loading and unloading

The following recommendations are made for the improvement of

Montgomery Street for handling of traffic and parking: 1. Widen Montgomery Street on

the west side away from Main Street for its entire length as provided in previous surveys. This could be done over a long period as the property is vacated. Sections now available should be widened and used for parking until all the street is widened.

2. Construct a sidewalk on the east side next to Main Street over its entire length in the space now provided between the street and the buildings along this street. A section or two of this walk has already been constructed.


